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72 1 Executive Summary: Engineering Chicanery and Dubious Intentions

The chronology of events, summarized below in this section and supported by references to other parts of 73 this white paper, reveals a pattern of behavior by multiple individuals in the City of Encinitas (COE) and 74 its contractors. This pattern is so complicated and convoluted that it defies the rationality one would expect 75 in a straight-forward engineering effort to solve a long-standing stormwater problem. One of the strangest 76 things about this whole activity is the extent to which it appears to be choreographed. One has to ask 'Why 77 the coverup?'. 78 Why not simply be open and reasonable about developing a stormwater management solution for Leu-79 cadia, and Encinitas overall, rather than going to all the extraordinary effort to break it up and hide it in 80 various fragments of contracts and designs? This is either (1) incredibly foolish and wasteful but simply 81 the result of incompetence and piece-meal decision-making optimization or (2) there are other non-obvious 82 reasons. Then the obvious questions are what are those reasons and who is responsible for planning this 83 elaborate ruse? First, let's look at the sequence of events and, later, contemplate alternative hypotheses to 84

explain these facts.

(1) In 2018-07: The hydrology section of the Streetscape EIR was reviewed and found to be substantially
deficient. This led to a series of meetings, some public, some not public, involving the COE, SANDAG,
and the North County Transit District (NCTD) and the right-of-way of the railroad through Encinitas.
Finally, NCTD came to a meeting of the COE City Council, and along with SANDAG, essentially said
they would not grant ROW exceptions needed for Streetscape unless COE fixed its stormwater problems
to the extent that they affect the railroad operations.

(2) 2018-12-12: COE applied for grant monies from CALTRANS to model the hydrodynamics of the
 watershed and was rejected. This shows that COE knew it needed to analyze the watershed properties
 before designing an engineering solution.

(3) 2019-08-28 Council Meeting: COE authorized \$431,857.20 to contractor Q3 to develop a watershed
 plan for Leucadia and Old Encinitas. There were no deliverables specified in this contract. It was made
 clear in that COE council meeting that this contract should produce an early, 'hurry-up' result that would
 enable Streetscape project to proceed

(4) 2020-05-11: A report from Michael Baker Company was delivered with an addendum produced by Q3.
 An attachment shows a diagram connecting the proposed stormwater plumbing to the three outfalls at
 Batiquitos Lagoon. The *North Coast Highway 101 Streetscape Project: Hydrology and Water Quality Technical Report*. This report is woefully inadequate in technical detail. Nonetheless, this report from
 Michael Baker identifies:

- (a) ...two existing outfall locations discharging runoff from the project area. Along N. Coast Highway
 105 101, immediately north of La Costa Ave, the first existing outfall (24" RCP) discharges runoff east
 of the 101 (east-101) into the southwestern-most sliver of the Batiquitos Lagoon. This portion of
 the Lagoon is tidally influenced and mostly cutoff from roughly 90-percent of the lagoon via a
 pinch point created by construction of a railroad bridge and associated embankments.
- (b) The second existing outfall consists of an 18" RCP and 24" RCP and drains west of the 101 (west-101), into a series of detention basins adjacent to the Ponto Beach parking lot, and then into the Lagoon immediately adjacent to the Pacific Ocean via open channel flow.
- (c) The project does include a new diversion structure immediately upstream of these two existing
 outfalls. This new diversion structure has been designed to control discharge to each of the existing
 outfalls while simultaneously providing flood control for the businesses and residents adjacent to
 N. Coast Highway 101 south of La Costa Avenue and water quality benefit for the Lagoon.

(5) 2020-10-10: Plans were received by the COE Development Services Department describing the engineering details of the plumbing and Batiquitos Lagoon terminus of the stormwater system without
 indicating the portion of the system that was built as part of the hotel project but originally identified as
 part of the stormwater system for Leucadia, driven by Streetscape.

(6) 2020-12: There was a scramble by COE staff to get a Notice of Determination sent to the County and
 the State in a hurry to stay within a 30-day window in which CEQA lawsuits could be filed about the
 stormwater solution and to avoid a 180-day window. Only after this was a public notice and review
 meeting held (i.e., CPP) and even then notice of the review was buried in an obscure COE website.

(7) 2021-01-19: The first public review of this effort was conducted via Zoom with only chat available for
 public comment.

(8) 2021-02-08: L. Doherty sent out CDPNF-4271-2020 CPP-004272-2020 - Final Report Approved.pdf
transcript of public meeting. J. Helly performed a machine translation of the audio from the meeting
using Transcribe which provides a word-for-word transcript sufficient to illustrate the bad-faith summary
by the COE. Read this with the audio from the meeting. J. Helly wrote to L. Doherty to object that the
transcript was not accurate. This was followed by and exchange whereby Doherty wanted Helly to
indicate objections with time-stamps. (cf. Appendix C)

- (9) 2021-02-12: J. Helly met with K. Hinze via zoom to review this Executive Summary and determine if
 she agrees it describes a pattern of deception on the part of the City of Encinitas. She said no.
- (10) 2021-02-16: J. Bankston sent out CDPNF-4271-2020 CPP-004272-2020 Final Report Approved.pdf

Throughout this period of time, I have repeatedly requested, in writing and oral presentations before the City of Encinitas city council, engineering analyses and details about the proposed solution. Nothing was forthcoming and the City Engineer, Ed Wimmer, repeatedly claimed he had to wait for more meetings and review by City Council.

Apparently, there isn't any analysis or evaluation other than the most cursory application of a simple hydraulic model for a foregone conclusion. There is no evidence of alternative design evaluations, competitive procurement or any of the normal evaluative processes one would expect from a sound decision-making process compliant with the extant regulatory framework.

Why go to all this trouble of subterfuge and hidden government? If this is all above board and based on sound science and engineering, good for the environment and people of Encinitas, why hide it?

157 **2 Background**

Note to the Reader: This history is the author's current understanding of the folklore and anecdotes about the stormwater problems in Leucadia. While there is some documentation summarized best in the Rick Engineering study, that summary is now dated and no longer reflects the state of the current system, such as it is. Consequently, the sequence of events is roughly correct, part of the reason for exposing it here in narrative form is to submit it to criticism and correction.

Leucadia has a long history of stormwater problems that are fundamentally due to its topography, railroad right-of-way, coastal proximity and infrastructure mismanagement. As Figures 1, 2 show, Leucadia is a watershed characterized by surfacewater channels that isolate the higher elevations between the Interstate 5 freeway to the east and the sandstone coastal bluffs to the west. Floodwater channels exist in the low-lying

areas along the railroad tracks and HWY101 and intrude into the residential and commercial properties on




Figure 4: Monthly precipitation record for Leucadia (1895-Present). This figure also contrasts the 100-year flood events with more frequent flooding events.

169 2.1 History of Leucadia Flooding

¹⁷⁰ In the mid-1990's, efforts began to mitigate the chronic storm flooding in Leucadia, possibly motivated by ¹⁷¹ the impact of the heavy rains in the El Nino events of the late 1980 and early 1990s (Figure 4).

In 1998, there was a proposal to install a large diameter (10 foot) stormwater system to dump stormwater into Batiquitos Lagoon. That was not implemented presumably because it would not be permitted by the


174 California Coastal Commission (CCC) and perhaps the Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB)

and was expensive. Instead, a *nuisance drain system* was built to remove water from the Leucadia Park area

and dump it out at Ponto, on the west side of HWY101, in an area referred to as a *sand-pit*. The nuisance

drain idea was pursued since it did not require the same permitting as the large system would have required,





were it ever to be built, and was much less costly.

In 1999, a low-flow, Leucadia Storm Drain System was designed by City of Encinitas with Pasco Engineering and approved by the California Coastal Commission. In 2002, this system was built with Tide-Flex valves added and called the *Pasco Fiasco* since, presumably, it did not work well.

In 2003, City of Encinitas put in 24-inch pipe and disconnected a pipe at Grandview although this latter action is uncertain (Figure 3). This was the year that Rick Engineering published a study under contract to




Figure 6: Stormwater pumping on to the beach at Beacons. (A) Blue outfall pipe on beach at Beacons. (B) Close-up of pipe. (C) No pipe on beach. (D) Pipe access manhole in Beacons parking lot. (E) Portable, City-operated pump in alley across from Leucadia Park shown flooded in Figure 5. (F) Portable, City-operated pump in Leucadia Park with connections to outfall pipe at Beacons (G), (H).

184 COE to look at the problem overall.

In 2004, a \$1.4M Rick Engineering Study was commissioned to make the low-flow Pasco system work. This involved adding a sluice gate valve at RCP on Vulcan along with orifice plates to reduce flow rates and a trench east of railroad to divert flow south (north?). Dudek Engineering was involved in the construction. This study employed the HEC-RAS modeling system and provided substantive detail about the model configuration and the run results.

In 2006, railroad ballast problems emerged due to diverted flow in the trench so the trench was Gunite-ed to stabilize ballast by the railroad. This dramatically increased flow in the trench since it was now lined with impervious material and it no longer functioned as a dispersive, infiltrative system component. Instead of acting as a slow drain, it became a static sump which could back up.

¹⁹⁴ From 2008-2010, residents on the west side opposed operation of the stormwater system as it was

causing flooding due to overloading when the sluice gate was used to clear Old Encinitas water.

During 2011-2012, the San Diego County Grand Jury [?] recommended that the City Council of Encini-196 tas take the actions to (1) develop an immediate plan to solve Leucadia's storm water (sic) flooding, (2) in-197 clude storm water flow through the bluff at Leucadia Roadside Park as part of an overall storm drain fix, and 198 (3) explore storm drain capital improvement tax funding for Leucadia via formation of a Special Assessment 199 District. At the time, Jerome Stocks was Mayor and Tony Kranz ran for City Council on fixing drainage. 200 June 20, 2012 Kranz requested the San Diego Grand Jury finding against Encinitas's handling of Leucadia 201 storm drains be addressed and the public should be involved in the Encinitas response to the Grand Jury. 202 Councilwoman Teresa Barth requested this be placed on an upcoming agenda and the resulting interaction 203 during the council meeting is available in the video from the Encinitas City Council Meeting, June 20, 2012. 204 The grand jury findings and recommendations were ignored. 205

In 2015, TetraTech did a study for the COE to evaluate alternatives for the Vulcan flooding [?]. This study used the HEC-HMS model and was fairly light-weight in details but focused strongly on bioretention and LID approaches to mitigating the stormwater problem.

During 2016-2017, the COE Engineering department, Ed Dean, designed a pipe from Union and Vulcan to the 78 inch pipe at Leucadia Pizza draining to Cottonwood Creek but this was never implemented. In 2018, Ed Wimmer replaced Chris Magnitsky (sp?) and that more or less brings us up to today.

In July, 2018, I reviewed the hydrology section of the Streetscape EIR and deemed it specious and inadequate. This report was sent to the COE and to the Coastal Commission as part of the hearing on the coastal development permit (CDP) exemption requested by the COE to implement the Streetscape project.

In late 2019, the COE contracted with Q3 to perform a hurry-up hydrological analysis of the Leucadia stormwater problems as part of a longer, larger hydrological analysis. The goal was to speed-up the analysis so the problem could be addressed within the Streetscape project without causing delays to that project. The currently proposed solution is to put a large diameter pipe under HWY101 and terminate it in the Batiquitos Lagoon without treatment.

Today, there are four (4) methods of disposing of the stormwater. They are: (1) gravity-fed flow to an 220 outfall pipe at Ponto (north) with input from multiple inlets including the Leucadia Park cistern. Although 221 there are two pipes at this outfall location, only one of these pipes, the 24-inch diameter pipe, is believed to 222 be in operation at the time of this writing. (2) Vulcan/Union Sluice Valve (east of the railroad near Union 223 Street and Vulcan Avenue). (3) Event-related pumping of stormwater out of the cistern in Leucadia Park 224 over the bluff onto the beach at Beacon Beach. (4) Cottonwood Creek Outfall (south), In summary, the 225 claim is made that Vulcan floods because of the Old Encinitas flooding problem but the Leucadia system 226 works as long as the sluice valve is not employed to relieve the flooding east of the railroad. 227

228 **3** Scientific Background

The main issues about appropriate management of stormwater pertain to the following questions: (1) What is the volume of stormwater that must be handled? (2) What is it contaminated with and where is it coming from? (3) How concentrated are the contaminants? (4) What methods are required to minmize the hazards of coastal pollution by storms? [?] [?]

259 4 Regulations

260 4.1 Federal

The Federal Clean Water Act (Clean Water Act) prohibits certain discharges of storm water containing pollutants except in compliance with a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. The NPDES stormwater program regulates some stormwater discharges from three potential sources: municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s), construction activities, and industrial activities.

The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) regulates storm water discharges from municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s) throughout the country. U.S. EPA defines an MS4 as a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels, or storm drains) owned or operated by a State (40 CFR 122.26(b)(8)).

Pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (Clean Water Act) section 402(p), storm water permits are required for discharges from an MS4 serving a population of 100,000 or more. The Municipal Storm Water Program manages the Phase I Permit Program (serving municipalities over 100,000 people), the Phase II Permit Program (for municipalities less than 100,000), and the Statewide Storm Water Permit for the State of California Department of Transportation. The State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) and Regional Water Quality Control Boards (collectively, the Water Boards) implement and enforce the Municipal Storm Water Program.

277 4.2 California

The California State Water Resources Control Board Storm Water Program provides guidance on the regu-278 latory framework for handling stormwater. Storm water is defined by US EPA as the runoff generated when 279 precipitation from rain and snowmelt events flows over land or impervious surfaces without percolating into 280 the ground. Storm water is often considered a nuisance because it mobilizes pollutants such as motor oil and 281 trash. In most cases, storm water flows directly to water bodies through sewer systems, contributing a ma-282 jor source of pollution to rivers, lakes, and the ocean. Storm water discharges in California are regulated 283 through National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits. However, storm water may 284 also act as a resource and recharge to groundwater when properly managed. The Water Boards are actively 285 involved in initiatives to improve the management of storm water as a resource. For more information read 286 our Storm Water Management Fact Sheet 287

288 4.2.1 California Coastal Commission

289 According to LUP Update Guide, Section 3. Water Quality Protection:

290 The Coastal Act requires the protection and enhancement of marine and coastal water resources, includ-

ing water quality. Nonpoint source (NPS) pollution, also called polluted runoff, is the nation's leading cause

of water pollution both at the coast and inland. As stormwater runoff flows across the land, it picks up nat-

- ural and human-made pollutants originating from many diffuse sources, and may transport these pollutants
- into coastal waters, including the ocean, rivers, streams, wetlands, estuaries, lakes, and groundwater.

Protection of coastal water resources requires not only minimizing pollutants in runoff, but also minimiz ing alterations in a site's natural hydrologic balance, including the runoff flow regime (i.e., runoff volume,
 flow rate, timing, and duration). Because of the dispersed nature of NPS pollution and the cumulative impact

of changes in runoff flows within a watershed, managing land uses both on a site-specific and a regional level is critical.

In California, the Coastal Commission and the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water 300 Board), in coordination with the nine Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Water Boards), 301 have developed a state NPS Program that provides a coordinated statewide approach to managing NPS pol-302 lution, and conforms to federal Clean Water Act and Coastal Zone Management Act requirements for states 303 to address NPS pollution. Many California state agencies are working collaboratively to implement the 304 state's NPS Program Plan. These efforts include the Storm Water and Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) 305 programs administered by the State and Regional Water Boards statewide, as well as coastal specific devel-306 opment planning and permitting programs of the Coastal Commission. 307

In the coastal zone, certified Local Coastal Programs (LCPs) are a key mechanism for achieving a high standard for coastal water resource protection. LCPs provide an important planning and regulatory framework for enhancing coastal NPS pollution control and minimizing changes in watershed hydrology that may adversely impact coastal resources. LCPs should be updated to include policies, standards, and ordinances that establish coastal water resource protection strategies and priorities for development, both during construction and over the life of a project

313 *during construction and over the life of a project.*

314 4.2.2 San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board (SD-RWQCB)

In response to an inquiry regarding pumping stormwater over the bluff onto the beach at Beacons, the San
 Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board responded:

According to the Regional MS4 Permit, outfall, storm water, and non-storm water are all included. The COE has a permit to discharge to their MS4 system from the **San Diego Water Board**. The outfall and pump you described would fall under our permit regulatory requirements regardless of the size of the outfall. The definition of MS4 includes facilities owned and operated by the City. It is not defined by a size.

We would expect the City as an agency under our Regional MS4 Permit to implement BMPs to the MEP for this system, inclusive of implement its requirements in its JRMP and the BMP Design Manual when applied to projects that meet certain criteria to reduce pollutants in storm water. If the City is not implementing its policies, procedures and ordinances it is also not meeting the MEP standard to reduce pollutants in storm water.

 Hydrology EIR.
- (2) The desired improvements described in this staff report, as well as the CALTRANS grant application
 and SOW, emphasize the limitations in the current COE hydrological understanding and analytical ca-
- pabilities as so clearly evidenced in the hydrology section of the Streetscape Hydrology EIR.
- (3) Modern hydrological modeling software, such as the USEPA Stormwater Management Model (EPA-SWMM) is an appropriate method for the types of analysis needed in our area. This open-source model is especially appropriate since it makes it possible for the independent verification and validation (IV&V) of a model's output, through reproduction of results, as is appropriate for publicly-funded, private contractor work.
- (4) In order for IV&V to be possible, all of the input data, software and model configuration metadata for 31 each run of the model must be published to the public using the many conventional means of doing so. 32 Consequently, any statement of work for a private contractor to perform analyses for the COE, 33 on behalf of the citizens, must require that the all of the input data and the configuration files, for 34 example those defining the topology and topography of the hydraulic networks, procedures and 35 parameterizations employed for each model run, be specified as required deliverables to the COE 36 on behalf of the public and that these be made public at or before payment to the contractor is 37 completed. The current SOW must be amended to state this as part of the contractor deliverables. 38 (5) **SOW p.19:** Refers to **PCSWMM** as representative of a flood model that might be used. This should 39 be properly characterized as a hydrology model applied to the problem of flooding and how it will 40 be applied. Hydrological modeling and flood-mapping are not the same thing. Nonetheless, this is 41 an expensive, commercial version of an open-source, free model codebase that is EPA-SWMM. The 42 contractor, who may want to use PCSWMM for convenience despite its high cost, should be required to 43
- ensure that any model case that is run with such an expensive, proprietary model must be reproducible
 with the open-source EPA-SWMM version.
- 46 (6) SOW p.14 RESPONSIBLE PARTIES: This document specifies the formation of a technical advisory
 47 committee (TAC) to include, for example, Leucadia 101 Mainstreet Association, NCTD, SEJPA, and
 48 SANDAG. This example should be extended to include the Encinitas Residents Coalition, for example,
 49 as well as private citizens with expertise in this field.
- 50 (7) **SOW Task 3.1:** This task identifies an open-ended field data collection for unspecified assessments to 51 support the Adaptation Plan. These should be further articulated in terms of methodology, data to be
- collected, and how it will be employed in an overall IV&V process to vet model results.

Recommendations for Leucadia Watershed Modeling Technical Advisory 1 11 411 12 Committee

The problems posed by the current inadequate stormwater system will not be solved by a modeling study 13 alone and, unless it is constrained by a clear problem statement and addresses specific decisions with 14 testable, valid predictions, it may be misleading and irrelevant. Any modeling study is only as good as 15 the problem definition that it addresses, its predictive value, testability, and reproducibility. 16

For example, any model should first be shown to be able to reproduce current conditions retrospectively 17 and provide estimates of the uncertainty associated with prospective design solutions within a well-defined 18 set of risk scenarios. Toward this end, here are some things to consider in advance of a modeling study. 19

They have value whether or not a modeling study is done and there is no reason to wait to begin since they 20

will have to be addressed explicitly or implicity anyway. 21

- 1. Define the problem(s) to be solved in functional and technical terms. These should be considered 22 to be the system requirements and developed to provide the basis for acceptance testing throughout 23 analysis, design and deployment. 24
- 2. Develop Risk Scenarios: Define the storm conditions (e.g., precipitation, tides, lagoon water levels, 25 groundwater depth and hydraulic connectivity) that the engineered infrastructure must accommodate. 26
- 3. Define the decision process pertaining to improving the Leucadia flooding problems. 27
- (a) What is the range of engineering solutions that are possible? 28
- (b) What failure modes are allowable and how will they be handled? 29
- (c) What are the pros and cons of each? 30
- (d) What COE processes and decisions are required to make a choice? 31
- (e) What information needs to be developed to support that decision process? This is where the 32 modeling contracting intersects the decision process. 33
- 4. Identify and articulate the regulatory constraints on design alternatives. 34
- (a) Recognize that MS4 permit violations can result in penalties of \$10K/day per violation and the 35 shutdown or prevention of any project that increases stormwater flows through hydromodifica-36 tions. 37
 - (b) Ensure the ability for independent verification and validation of engineering analyses used as a basis of the decisions referred to in 3d.
- 5. Require the use of interoperable watershed models and data. 40
- 6. Ensure that the COE owns the data, source code, model configurations and scenarios used to bound 41 the uncertainties in a modeling study. 42
- 7. Develop contracting strategies that ensure COE ownership of the results, avoids being held hostage 43 by contractors and provides for alternative sourcing of models and data for the indefinite future. 44

Regional Water Quality Control Board 1.1 45

The COE has a permit to discharge to their MS4 system from the San Diego Water Board. The outfall and 46 pumps currently being used fall under the existing permit regulatory requirements regardless of the size of 47 the outfall. The definition of MS4 includes facilities owned and operated by the City. It is not defined by a 48 size. 49

The RWQCB expects the City, as an agency under our Regional MS4 Permit, to implement BMPs to 50 the maximum extent practicable (MEP) for this system, inclusive of complying with the requirements in its 51 JRMP [4] and the BMP Design Manual [1] when applied to projects that are required to reduce pollutants 52 in storm water. If the City is not implementing its policies, procedures and ordinances it is also not meeting 53 the MEP standard to reduce pollutants in storm water. 54

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55 Water Quality Improvement Plan The COE included its JRMP in this Plan to meet the numeric goals 448 and schedules of the high priority water quality conditions. The City is in the Carlsbad WQIP [2].

SUBJECT:

Professional Services Contract for the Leucadia Area Watershed Master Plan (WD19E).

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the City Manager in consultation with the City Attorney, to execute a contract and any necessary amendments and time extensions, with Q3 Consulting in the amount of \$375,528 plus 15% contingency for a total contract amount not to exceed \$431,857.20 to prepare the Leucadia Area Watershed Master Plan (WD19E) (Attachment 1).

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This project aligns with the Strategic Plan goals for:

- 1) Community Planning focus area which strives to maintain safe and livable communities through well-maintained infrastructure and facilities and strong public safety; and
- 2) Transportation focus area which is to provide effective, safe, and easy transportation for all modes of movement and for all demographics.

FISCAL CONSIDERATIONS:

Council amended the FY 2018/19 Adopted Budget on June 19, 2019 to add \$583,000 for the Leucadia Area Watershed Master Plan (CIP). The fiscal impact associated with the staff recommendation is included in the adopted budget. No additional funding is being requested.

BACKGROUND:

On November 30, 2018, a \$524,000 Caltrans Sustainable Communities Transportation Planning Grant application was submitted to develop a three-dimensional hydraulic watershed model to identify projects that would address flooding to improve the transportation network in the Leucadia area watershed. In June 2019, the City was notified that the grant application was not selected for funding.

Staff was pursuing this funding because prior to incorporation, Leucadia and Old Encinitas were developed with a rural theme without traditional drainage infrastructure. These areas are susceptible to historic flood hazards and the associated transportation impacts. North Coast Highway 101 and

⁴¹⁵ adjacent properties experience nuisance flooding in common rain events and are susceptible to significant flood impacts in more extreme rain events.

Past plans and studies reference the extent, frequency and intensity of local flooding, examine causal factors, and identify potential mitigation options. Specifically, a drainage study (commonly referred to as the "Rick Study" because it was completed by Rick Engineering) was conducted in 2003, but the scope was limited to the area north of North Court. The findings of the 2003 report will inform the new study, but because there is a need to study a broader area; the availability of new technology, and changes to the current hydraulic and hydrologic status of the watersheds resulting from the implementation of drainage improvements, there is a need for a new study.

A new study will inform decision makers to help facilitate the efficient deployment of capital funds. Future flood mitigation improvements will also be critical in planning the next segments of the regional Coastal Rail Trail in Leucadia and the Railroad Double Tracking projects.

The Leucadia Area Watershed Master Plan will employ robust modeling software to comprehensively analyze flooding conditions in the Leucadia and Old Encinitas areas and address current and future flood impacts. The Master Plan will be a dynamic tool to prioritize projects for initial implementation and will adapt over time as improvements are built.

ANALYSIS:

The Leucadia and Old Encinitas basins will be considered together in the Master Plan to allow for solutions that cross drainage basins or accept runoff from both. Along Coast Highway 101, the comprehensive approach will include North Court to La Costa Avenue in the Leucadia basin and the area south of North Court in the Old Encinitas basin. Recommendations will be for the entire North Coast Highway 101 corridor, which spans both basins.

On August 2, 2019, the City received proposals from three engineering firms in response to a Request For Proposals (RFP) posted on June 27, 2019. Rick Engineering and Q3 Consulting were short-listed and interviewed. Staff is recommending that Q3 Consulting be selected.

The Q3 Consulting team delivered a complete, accurate, and thorough proposal (Attachment 2) covering all aspects required to complete the master plan within the aggressive time frames required by the schedule. The Q3 Consulting team includes Michael Baker International. The Q3 Consulting team has vast experience with advanced XPSWMM and PCSWMM modeling, offers a potentially fresh perspective to an extremely challenging flood control/drainage area, and, is well suited to coordinate effectively with the Leucadia Streetscape design team.

The project is estimated to take one year to complete. However, the Q3 Consulting team is committed to expediting project recommendations to inform the Leucadia Streetscape design, projected to be received by October 31, 2019.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The actions being considered by City Council are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because the items are not a "project" per Section 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines. This item is not related to the Climate Action Plan.

AGREEMENT FOR DESIGN PROFESSIONAL CONSULTANT SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF ENCINITAS AND Q3 CONSULTING

THIS Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the date of execution by the City of Encinitas, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "City", and Q3 Consulting, hereinafter referred to as "Consultant."

RECITALS

The City requires outside assistance to provide the following services:

LEUCADIA AREA WATERSHED MASTER PLAN

WHEREAS, Consultant represents itself as possessing the necessary skills and qualifications to provide the services required by the City and as being fully qualified to perform those services in accordance with the standard of quality ordinarily expected of competent professionals in Consultant's field of expertise;

WHEREAS, Consultant will render such professional services, as hereinafter defined, on the following terms and conditions;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of these recitals and the mutual covenants contained herein, the City and Consultant agree as follows:

1.0 TERM OF AGREEMENT

1.1 This Agreement shall be effective on and from the day, month and year of the execution of this document by the City.

1.2 Consultant shall commence the performance of services in accordance with the Scope of Work section provided in Attachment "A" to this Agreement and shall continue such services until all tasks to be performed are completed, or this Agreement is otherwise terminated.

2.0 CONSULTANT'S OBLIGATIONS- SCOPE OF WORK (ATTACHMENT A)

2.1 Consultant shall provide the City with the following services:

The specific manner in which the services are to be performed is described in **Attachment "A"** which is attached hereto, and incorporated herein as though fully set forth at length, collectively hereinafter referred to as "Described Services".

2.2 Consultant shall perform all work required to accomplish the Described Services in conformity with applicable requirements of law: Federal, State, and Local.

2.3 Consultant is hired to render the Described Services and any payments made to Consultant are compensation fully for such services.

2.4 Consultant shall maintain professional certifications as required in order to properly comply with all City, State, and Federal law.

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2.5 Consultant shall assign only competent personnel to perform services pursuant to this Agreement. In the event that City, in good faith, at any time during the term of this Agreement, desires the removal of any such persons, Consultant shall, immediately upon receiving notice from City of such desire of City, cause the removal of such person or persons.

2.6 If a license or certification of any kind is required of Consultant, its employees, agents, or subcontractors by federal, state or local law and regulation, Consultant warrants that such license has been obtained, is valid and in good standing, and shall keep in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement, and that any applicable bond has been posted in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.

2.7 Consultant shall provide the City with timely written reports of all significant developments or delays arising during performance of its services.

3.0 Payment for Services (Attachment B)

3.1 Payment to Consultant to perform the Scope of Work as set forth in **Attachment B**, attached hereto and incorporated herein. The payments provided in this Section are full compensation for the Scope of Work as described in Attachment A.

3.2 Consultant shall submit monthly invoices to the City, describing its services and costs provided during the previous month, based upon percentage of task completed. Except as specifically authorized by City, Consultant shall not bill City for duplicate services performed by more than one person. Consultant's monthly bills shall include the following information to which such services or costs pertain: a description of services performed; the date the services were performed; the number of hours spent and by whom; a description of all costs incurred, and the Consultant's signature. Consultant agrees to use every appropriate method to contain fees and costs under this Agreement. Once an invoice is submitted and approved by the City, City payment will be made within 30 days of approval.

3.3 The amount set forth in Attachment B may be modified or amended only by a written document executed by both Consultant and authorized City representative prior to the performance of the additional work. Such document shall expressly state that it is intended by the parties to amend the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

4.0 <u>Subcontracting (Attachment C)</u>

4.1 Consultant will not subcontract any portion of its Scope of Work without prior written approval of City. If Consultant subcontracts for any of the work to be performed under this Agreement, Consultant shall be as fully responsible to the City for the acts and omissions of Consultant's subcontractors/subconsultants and for the persons either directly or indirectly employed by the subcontractors/subconsultants, as Consultant is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by Consultant. Nothing contained in the Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor/sub-consultant of Consultant and the City. Consultant will be responsible for payment of subcontractors/subconsultants. Consultant shall bind every subcontractor/sub-consultant to the terms of the Agreement applicable to Consultant's work unless specifically noted to the contrary in the subcontract in question and approved in writing by the City. Consultant agrees that the City is an intended third party beneficiary of any services agreement entered into between Consultant and any subcontractor or sub-consultant.

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4.2 The name and location of the place of business of each approved subcontractor or sub-consultant who will perform work or labor or render service to the Consultant in performing this Agreement are contained in **Attachment C** which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as though fully set forth at length.

5.0 Project Schedule and Completion Date (Attachment D)

5.1 **Attachment D** is the project schedule that Consultant shall strictly meet, including benchmark dates and completion date, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein. Consultant agrees to diligently prosecute the services to be provided under this Agreement to completion and in accordance with the schedule specified herein. In the performance of this Agreement, time is of the essence.

5.2 Consultant shall promptly notify the City of any anticipated or unforeseen delays to the project schedule. Extensions to the project schedule and to this Agreement shall not be made without the prior written approval of the City. All requests for extensions to the project schedule shall be by written request only and submitted to the City prior to the commencement of such work.

6.0 Changes in Work and Extra Work

Consultant shall not change the scope or duration of work or perform work in excess of the Scope of Work without the prior, written approval of the City by an executed Change Order, regardless to whether or not the work would be for compensation, describing in detail the revision to Scope of Work, revisions in payment and/or time, fully executed by both parties. Failure to obtain a Change Order prior to the commencement of any revision waives Contractor's right to payment for such additional services.

7.0 Verbal Agreement or Conversation

No verbal agreement or conversation with any officer, agent or employee of the City, either before, during or after the execution of this Agreement, shall affect or modify any of the terms or obligations herein contained nor shall such verbal agreement or conversation entitle Consultant to any additional payment whatsoever.

8.0 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>

8.1 In the event of Consultant's failure to prosecute, deliver, or perform the described services, the City may terminate this Agreement by notifying Consultant by certified mail of said termination. Thereupon, Consultant shall cease work and within five (5) working days: (1) assemble all materials and records prepared or obtained in the performance of this Agreement and deliver said documents to the CITY and (2) place all work in progress in a safe and protected condition. The City Manager of the City shall make a determination of the percentage of work which Consultant has performed which is usable and of worth to the City. Based upon that finding, the City shall determine any final payment due to Consultant.

8.2 This Agreement may be terminated by either party, without cause, upon the giving of ten (10) days written notice to the other party. Prior to the 10th day following the giving of the notice, the Consultant shall: (1) assemble all materials and records prepared or obtained in the performance of this Agreement and deliver said documents to the CITY and (2) place all work in progress in a safe and protected condition. The City Manager shall make a determination of the

percentage of work which Consultant has performed which is usable and of worth to the City. Based upon that finding, the City shall determine any final payment due to Consultant.

9.0 <u>Covenants against Contingent Fees</u>

Consultant warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working for Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that Consultant has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon, or resulting from, the award or making of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, the City shall have the right to terminate this Agreement without liability or, at the City's discretion, to deduct from the Agreement price or consideration, or otherwise recover the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or contingent fee.

10.0 Ownership of Documents

10.1 All computer data, computer drawing files, plans, studies, sketches, drawings, reports, specifications and all work product produced by Consultant under this Agreement are the property of the City, whether or not the City completes the Scope of Work or proceeds with the project for which such documents are prepared.

10.2 This Agreement creates a nonexclusive and perpetual right or license for City to copy, use, modify, reuse, and sublicense any and all copyrights, designs, and other intellectual property embodied in the writings prepared by Consultant, and Consultant subcontractors, under this Agreement. In the event the City should ever desire to undertake a project or review other proposed projects based upon the documents, the Consultant agrees that the City shall have the right to reuse all or any portion of the documents at no additional compensation to the Consultant.

11.0 Independent Contractor

11.1 The Consultant shall perform the services provided for herein in a manner of Consultant's own choice, as an independent Contract and in pursuit of Consultant's independent calling, and not as an employee of the City. Consultant shall be under control of the City only as to the result to be accomplished and the personnel assigned to the Project.

11.2 If the Consultant subcontracts any of the work to be performed under this Agreement, Consultant shall be as fully responsible to the City or the acts and omissions of the Consultant's subcontractor and of the persons either directly or indirectly employed by the subcontractor, as Consultant is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by Consultant. Nothing contained in the Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor of Consultant and the City. The Consultant shall bind every subcontract by the terms of the Agreement applicable to Consultant's work, including indemnity and insurance requirements.

12.0 Hold Harmless and Indemnification

12.1 <u>Indemnification</u> - It is understood and agreed that Consultant has the professional skills, experience, and knowledge necessary to perform the work agreed to be performed under this Agreement that City relies upon the professional skills of Consultant to do and perform Consultant's work in a skillful and professional manner, and Consultant thus agrees to so perform the work.

12.2 Acceptance by City of the work performed under this Agreement does not operate as a release of said Consultant from such professional responsibility for the work performed. It is further understood and agreed that Consultant is apprised of the scope of the work to be performed under this Agreement and Consultant agrees that said work can and shall be performed in a fully competent manner.

12.3 Consistent with California Civil Code section 2782.8, when the services to be provided under this Agreement are design professional services to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined under said section 2782.8, Consultant shall indemnify and hold harmless City, and its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers, from and against all claims, demands, damages, costs, or liability (including liability for claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses, or costs of any kind, interest, defense costs, and expert witness fees) arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Consultant, its officers, employees, subcontractors, subconsultants or agents during the performance this Agreement, or from any violation of any federal, state, or municipal law or ordinance to the extent caused, in whole or in part, by the negligence, reckless, or willful misconduct of Consultant or its employees, subcontractors, or agents, excepting only liability arising from the negligence, or misconduct of City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers.

12.4 Other than in the performance of professional services by a design professional, which law shall be solely as addressed in subparagraph 12.3 above, and to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant shall indemnify, protect, defend, and hold harmless City, and its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers, from and against any claims, demands, damages, costs, or liability (including liability for claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses, or costs of any kind, interest, defense costs, and expert witness fees) arising out of the performance of this Agreement by Consultant, its officers, employees, agents, subcontractors and subconsultants, excepting only that resulting from the negligence, or intentional misconduct of City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers. It is understood that the duty of Consultant to indemnify and hold harmless includes the duty to defend as set forth in section 2778 of the California Civil Code.

12.5 Acceptance of insurance certificates and endorsements required under this Agreement does not relieve Consultant from liability under this indemnification and hold harmless clause. This indemnification and hold harmless clause shall apply whether or not such insurance policies shall have been determined to be applicable to any of such damages or claims for damages.

13.0 Assignment of Agreement

Consultant is without right to and shall not assign this Agreement or any part thereof or any monies due hereunder without the prior written consent of the City.

14.0 Insurance

14.1 Insurance. On or before beginning any of the services or work called for by any term of this Agreement, Consultant, at its own cost and expense, shall carry, maintain for the duration of the Agreement (including all extensions provided), and provide proof thereof that is acceptable to the City the insurance specified in subsections (A) through (F) below with insurers and under forms of insurance satisfactory in all respects to the City. Consultant shall not allow any

subcontractor to commence work on any subcontract until all insurance required of the Consultant has also been obtained for the subcontractor. The Certificate of Insurance shall clearly identify the project name and number in the space labeled "Description of Operations/Locations/Special Items" on the form.

A. <u>Commercial General and Automobile Liability</u>.

Consultant, at Consultant's own cost and expense, shall maintain commercial general and automobile liability insurance for the period covered by this Agreement in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, combined single limit coverage for risks associated with the work contemplated by this Agreement. If a Commercial General Liability Insurance or an Automobile Liability form or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the work to be performed under this Agreement or the general aggregate limit shall be at least twice the required occurrence limit. Such coverage shall include but shall not be limited to, protection against claims arising from bodily and personal injury, including death resulting therefrom, and damage to property resulting from activities contemplated under this Agreement, including the use of owned and nonowned automobiles.

Coverage shall be at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability occurrence form CG 0001 and Insurance Services Office Automobile Liability form CA 0001 Code 1 (any auto).

Each of the following shall be included in the insurance coverage or added as an additional insured endorsement to the policy: City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers are to be covered as insured's as respects each of the following: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of Consultant, including the insured's general supervision of Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant; premises owned, occupied or used by Consultant; or automobiles owned, leased, hired, or borrowed by Consultant. In the event that Consultant purchases automobiles during the term of this Agreement, said automobiles shall be likewise covered. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to City, its officers, employees, agents, or volunteers.

An endorsement must state that coverage is primary insurance and that no other insurance affected by the City will be called upon to contribute to a loss under the coverage.

Insurance is to be placed with California- admitted insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A:VII.

B. <u>Professional Liability</u>.

Consultant shall obtain, and during the term of this Agreement shall maintain, a policy of professional liability insurance that shall:

A. Be from an insurance company authorized to be in business in the State of

California;

B. Be in an insurable amount of not less than \$1,000,000 for each occurrence;

and

C. Provide that the policy shall remain in full force during the full term of this Agreement and shall not be canceled, terminated, or allowed to expire without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the City from the insurance company.

C. <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. Statutory Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employer's Liability insurance for any and all persons employed directly or indirectly by Consultant shall be provided with limits not less than one million dollars. In the alternative, Consultant may rely on a self-insurance program to meet these requirements so long as the program of self-insurance complies fully with the provisions of the California Labor Code. The insurer, if insurance is provided, or the Consultant, if a program of self-insurance is provided, shall waive all rights of subrogation against the City for loss arising from work performed under this Agreement.

D. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>. During the period covered by this Agreement, upon express written authorization of City Risk Manager, Consultant may increase such deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers. The City may condition approval of an increase in deductible or self-insured retention levels upon a requirement that Consultant procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses that is satisfactory in all respects to each of them.

E. **Notice of Reduction in Coverage**. In the event that any coverage required under subsections (A), (B), or (C) of this section of the Agreement is reduced, limited, or materially affected in any other manner, Consultant shall provide written notice to City at Consultant's earliest possible opportunity and in no case later than five day after Consultant is notified of the change in coverage.

F. <u>Other Remedies</u>. In addition to any other remedies City may have if Consultant fails to provide or maintain any insurance policies or policy endorsements to the extent and within the time herein required, City may, at its sole option:

i. Obtain such insurance and deduct and retain the amount of the premiums for such insurance from any sums due under the Agreement;

ii. Order Consultant to stop work under this Agreement or withhold any payment which becomes due to Consultant hereunder, or both stop work and withhold any payment, until Consultant demonstrates compliance with the requirements hereof;

iii. Terminate this Agreement.

iv. Exercise of any of the above remedies, however, is an alternative to other remedies City may have and is not the exclusive remedy for Consultant's failure to maintain insurance or secure appropriate endorsements.

15.0 Disputes

15.1 If a dispute should arise regarding the performance of this Agreement, the following initial dispute resolution procedures shall be used:

A. Within twenty (20) City working days after a dispute regarding the performance of this Agreement arises, it shall be reduced to writing at staff level by the complaining party setting forth the nature of the dispute in detail, along with all pertinent back up documentation in support. The writing shall be delivered to the receiving party by first class mail or personal delivery directly to the party's project manager, along with recommended methods of resolution.

B. The party receiving the letter shall reply to the letter with a detailed response, along with a recommended method of resolution, if any, within ten (10) City working days of receipt of the letter.

15.2 If the dispute is not resolved at staff level in accordance with Section 14.1, within five (5) City working days of the receiving party response (or longer if agreed between the parties) , the aggrieved party, through its respective project manager shall deliver to the City Manager's office a letter outlining the dispute for the City Manager's review. The receiving party may submit further response, if required, to the City manager within five (5) city working days thereafter. The City Manager, at his/her sole discretion may respond as he/she deems appropriate, including recommendations for resolution, discussions or rejection of the dispute within fifteen (15) working days of receipt of the complaint.

15.3 If the dispute remains unresolved and the parties have exhausted the procedures outlined in this section, the parties may then seek remedies available to them under this Agreement and at law, including, but not limited to, under the termination procedures. This provision does not relieve Consultant of its obligation and Consultant is required to timely comply with all applicable provisions of the Government Claims Act before initiating any legal proceeding against City.

16.0 Conflict of Interest.

Contractor warrants and covenants that it presently has no interest in, nor shall any interest be hereinafter acquired in, any matter which will render the services required under the provisions of this Agreement a violation of any applicable state, local, or federal law, including, but not limited to, Government Code section 1090. If any principal provider of services is a "consultant" for the purposes of the Fair Political Practices Act (Gov. Code § 81000 et seq.), each such person shall comply with Form 721 Statement of Economic Interests filing requirements in accordance with state or City local Conflict of Interest Code. In addition, if any other conflict of interest should nevertheless hereinafter arise, Consultant shall promptly notify City of the existence of such conflict of interest so that the City may determine whether to terminate this Agreement.

17.0 Consultant's Books and Records.

17.1 Consultant shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services, or expenditures and disbursements charged to City for a minimum period of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to Consultant.

17.2 Consultant shall maintain all documents and records which demonstrate performance under this Agreement for a minimum period of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of termination or completion of this Agreement.

17.3 Any records or documents required to be maintained pursuant to this Agreement shall be made available for inspection or audit, at any time during regular business hours, upon written request by the City Attorney, City Auditor, City Manager, or a designated representative of any of these officers. Copies of such documents shall be provided to City for inspection when it is practical to do so. Otherwise, unless an alternative is mutually agreed upon, the records shall be available at Consultant's address indicated for receipt of notices in this Agreement.

17.4 City may, by written request by any of the above-named officers, require that custody of the records be given to City and that the records and documents be maintained in

the City Manager's office. Access to such records and documents shall be granted to any party authorized by Consultant's representatives, or Consultant's successor in interest.

18.0 Written Notification

Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication that either party desires or is required to give to the other party shall be in writing and either served personally or sent by prepaid, first class mail. Any such notice, demand, etc. shall be addressed to the other party at the address set forth below. Either party may change its address by notifying the other party of the change of address. Notice shall be deemed communicated within 48 hours from the lime of mailing if mailed as provided in this section.

19.3 This Agreement and all matters relating to it shall be governed by the laws of the State of California and any action brought relating to this Agreement shall be held exclusively in a state court in the County of San Diego.



La Quinta Focused Drainage Study, La Quinta, CA

The Q3 and Michael Baker team members prepared hydrology and hydraulic analysis and developed a stormwater master plan for an area of the City of La Quinta hardest hit by the extreme storm events in 2013 and 2014. The study evaluated the flood risk associated with extreme storm events and identified potential drainage improvements to reduce future flood damage and increase public safety if or when extreme storm events occur. The team prepared a coupled 1D and 2D hydrology and hydraulic model encompassing three square miles in the City. This innovative modelling incorporated surface topography with as-built storm drain information and distributed rainfall to accurately model the unique conditions of the study area.

The study included the preparation of a coupled 1D and 2D hydrology and hydraulic model for the study area. Offsite hydrology was prepared using County Hydrology Manual procedures. Onsite hydrology was evaluated using a direct rainfall method, or "rain on grid" applied over the study area. The model was correlated to historical flood photos taken during the September 2014 storm event. The advance model was used to more accurately depict drainage flow paths and overflow patterns and storm water runoff volumes in the identification of appropriate storm drain infrastructure. The results of the analysis were used to develop alternatives and cost estimates for recommended improvements to reduce the flood hazard during extreme events.



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Grand Terrace Focused Area Master Plan Update, Grand Terrace, CA

Q3 Consulting provided engineering services to update the "Pico" area of the City's master plan of drainage. The City's draft master plan update was never completed and lacked the necessary information for the required storm drain sizes associated with new development projects. The update for the Pico area included an advanced hydrology/ hydraulic model that used a combination of 2-d surface flow analysis with a 1-d subsurface (storm drain) analysis. Due to the steep terrain, and gridded street network, a rain-on-grid approach was used for the developed urban areas to more accurately determine the stormwater runoff patterns. The hydrology for the hillslopes tributary to the urban areas were prepared in accordance with San Bernardino County hydrology methods.

The update included the evaluation of the existing watershed conditions to identify the deficiencies and flood prone areas. These areas were confirmed through discussions with City staff and review of historic flooding documentation. Q3 identified a set of potential alternatives and evaluated the effectiveness in the hydrology/hydraulic model. The results of the alternatives analysis runs were used to determine the most cost-effective solutions for the deficient areas. Alignments and facilities sizes were prepared for the recommended storm drain systems. A focused master plan update report was prepared and is being processed for approval through the City.

Redlands Drainage Master Plan, Redlands, CA

Q3 and Michael Baker team members managed the development of a drainage master plan for the city to update its drainage infrastructure and to identify regional drainage solutions to the city's flooding issues. The heavily developed and historical downtown portion of the city has been plagued by several large flood events during the past few decades, some resulting in more than four feet of water. The study developed a state-of-the-art drainage master plan to identify solutions for this issue. Services included advanced hydrologic and hydraulic modeling, flood control alternative evaluation using XPSWMM, City-wide master drainage plan development and stakeholder coordination.

The team prepared a linked one-dimensional and two-dimensional model for the downtown area, using XPSWMM software to evaluate surface and subsurface conveyance capacities. Multiple studies had been performed over the last few decades to try and find solutions to the downtown flooding, with no success. By using an advanced hydraulic model, we were able to identify major issues, previously unknown to the City, and develop mitigation alternatives that worked. Due to the historic nature of the downtown area, and the lack of options for implementing drainage infrastructure, it was crucial to use an advanced model to identify viable alternatives that were constructible and feasible.

This comprehensive model allowed the team to run multiple scenarios rapidly to identify the weaknesses of the existing system and to recommend appropriate improvements for the regional and local drainage infrastructure. 

Zanja Channel. The study prepared a prioritized ranking system for the proposed improvements. A major hurdle for the City was to gain the acceptance of the City Council and several outside stakeholders. Initially unsuccessful with traditional hydraulic output graphics, the team prepared a three-dimensional animation to help stakeholders understand the flood hazards and the benefits of the proposed improvements. The result was a unanimous vote to proceed with the next step in the funding process.

Maple Canyon Watershed Master Plan, San Diego, CA

Michael Baker prepared a comprehensive master plan for a portion of the Pueblo Canyon Watershed (area tributary to the existing 54-inch storm drain in Laurel Street, termed the Maple Canyon Watershed). The master plan included development of a geospatial dataset for the storm drain system and drainage characteristics for the Maple Canyon Watershed study area necessary to complete the hydrologic and hydraulic (H&H) modeling, water quality modeling, and environmental mitigation analysis.

Michael Baker prepared a GIS-based storm drain inventory, developed an existing condition H&H model from the current San Diego storm drain data, identified existing undersized facilities and locations of flooding, proposed drainage improvements, and modeled the proposed drainage improvements. Hydrologic and hydraulic modeling was performed in PC-SWMM utilizing a detailed 2D surface. The model incorporated planned water quality improvements within the watershed. A web mapping application was also developed to display the storm drain inventory and the results of the master plan study. The web map allows city staff to easily find and navigate the numerous recommendations to improve the system.

Significant erosion occurs within Maple Canyon during wet weather. Even in smaller rain events, a large amount of sediment is transported through the storm drain system and deposited on private property and in the public right-of-way in locations where the existing pipes surcharge. This project analyzed several stabilization alternatives within the canyon. A series or prioritized potential environmental mitigation sites were identified first through desktop analysis and then further refined using the California Rapid Assessment Method based on site inspection. All three objectives (flood control, water quality/erosion control, and environmental mitigation) were jointly considered to develop a comprehensive plan for the watershed. The results of the master planning efforts were also compiled into a web-based portal for use by city staff.

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Los Peñasquitos Watershed Master Plan, San Diego, CA

Michael Baker developed a master plan for the City of San Diego's jurisdiction area of the Los Peñasquitos watershed. The master plan's primary goal was to identify and prioritize capital improvement plans required to meet the desired level of service requirements for flood control, water quality, habitat, and water conservation for this watershed.

The master plan was developed on an accelerated schedule and included development of a geospatial dataset for the storm drain system and drainage characteristics for the watershed study area, hydrologic & hydraulic modeling, water quality modeling, and lagoon modeling. Work also included identifying and analyzing stream rehabilitation, lagoon restoration, and habitat mitigation opportunities.

Hydrology and hydraulics (H&H) was modeled using PCSWMM software. The task included watershed delineation, subcatchment parameter estimation and 1D hydraulic modeling for the storm drain system. 2D modeling was provided for focused known flooding areas. This effort was prepared consistent with data collection methods used in the Chollas Creek Watershed Master Plan task order to ensure that the geospatial data coverage throughout the City is at the same resolution.

The Los Peñasquitos watershed management area (WMA) encompasses approximately 94 square miles of urban land and undeveloped open space extending from the Los Peñasquitos Lagoon beyond Highway 67 to the east. The WMA includes Torrey Pines, Del Mar, Carmel Valley, Sorrento Valley, Mira Mesa, Rancho Peñasquitos, Carmel Mountain, Sabre Springs, and Poway. Alluvial canyons drain into three main creeks (Carmel Valley Creek, Los Peñasquitos Creek, and Carroll Canyon Creek) that lead into the Los Peñasquitos Lagoon and ultimately the Pacific Ocean. The Los Peñasquitos WMA is mostly within City jurisdiction (~70 percent), with the remaining areas in the City of Poway, County of San Diego, and City of Del Mar.

North Coast Highway 101 Streetscape, Encinitas, CA

Michael Baker is providing civil engineering, traffic, and environmental services for the North Coast Highway 101 Streetscape Improvements Project. 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Project Understanding

The City of Encinitas (City) has experienced a long history of flooding in the Leucadia and Old Encinitas areas. Much of the recurring flooded areas are located in relatively flat terrain with minimal or restricted drainage infrastructure. This area has been subject to several studies and evaluations over the last few decades, resulting in potential regional solutions that were never constructed due to budget constraints. The City is now requesting a "new look" at the flooding issues using the latest modeling technology.

Previous studies used traditional stormwater modeling techniques. The most comprehensive studies performed to date utilized a combination HEC-1 (or HEC-HMS) for hydrology and HEC-RAS or WSPGW (1-dimensional

models) for hydraulics. Although these modes are still widely used, they are based on simplistic methods, lacking the capability to accurately analyze complex urban environments. For drainage areas that are extremely flat with restricted outlet conditions, these models will not provide a realistic picture of the current flooding issues or potential feasible solutions.


The City has requested services from a consultant specializing in hydrologic and hydraulic modeling to reevaluate the Leucadia and Old Encinitas areas and prepare a detailed and watershed-scale master plan using a "robust" modeling software.

Stormwater modeling technology has come a long way in the last 20 years. With faster computer speeds

and improved graphic user interfaces, advanced hydrologic and hydraulic modeling allows for more accurate and realistic evaluations of watersheds, ultimately identifying more feasible and cost effective solutions. The Q3 Team has been on the forefront of urban stormwater modeling since 1995, providing advanced hydrologic and hydraulic analyses within Southern California for multiple Counties and Cities. The Q3 Team's work in urban area 1-Dimensional/2-Dimensional analyses has been subject of international presentations and awards. The team recently completed a 1- and 2-D model for the City of Grand Terrace which was used to identify feasibly drainage solutions within the tight constraints of the City's urban core.

The City is requesting a complete a complete assessment and concept design of several priority projects. The Q3 team will coordinate with the City to establish priorities and goals for evaluating and selecting projects based on typical fundamental priorities, including the following:

- 1. Life/Safety
- 2. Emergency Access & Transportation
- 3. Property Protection

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These areas will be selected based on criteria developed in conjunction with City staff and the results of the advanced hydraulic models. The Q3 Team will develop detailed project concepts for each one of these areas, and include multiple sheet layouts, illustrations and renderings. The concepts will be developed in a manner to support potential future grant or capital funding requests.


A project completion of 12 months will require a fast-track study with a team that offers experts in advanced hydrologic and hydraulic modeling, local knowledge, and facilities design. The Q3 team is a multidisciplinary team, which means additional subconsultants or partnerships are not needed, and we are fully capable of providing a seamless work flow from project initiation to completion.

Key Issues

The Q3 Team has identified several key issues, technical and non-technical, that will influence the project. Resolution of these issues is incorporated into our project approach. We have provided a brief description of the key issues and our methods to address/resolve the issues.

Advanced Software Selection & Experience

The City has recognized the need for a more advanced model study. Several past studies have been performed using the traditional hydrologic and hydraulic software with varying results. Advanced modeling software has been around for 30 years, and there are multiple options to choose from. The Request for Proposals identified two advanced models as examples of what could be used, although there are dozens available. The Q3 Team has used both PCSWMM and XPSMM (also referred to as XPSTORM) in addition to other 1-D/2-D models. The difference between the two models is PCSWMM's 2-D engine mimic's the full Shallow Flow Equations (2-D) by converting surface flows into 1-D calculations (i.e.

surface flow is converted into shallow channels). Also referred to as a "quasi-2D" model, this type of model is useful for concept level analyses of smaller focused areas. We have found that using the 1-D/2-D engine in PCSWMM for areas larger than 100 acres requires an extensively long calculation time. For example, the Leucadia watershed would take several days to complete one model run. To fix this, we would have to separate the model into multiple sub-watersheds and link the results together. This process can be time consuming and subject to error. At this time, we believe the best software model to use would be XPSWMM (or XPSTORM) by Innovyze. This model will allow for a single comprehensive model. The benefits of this model will include running multiple scenarios for different concepts and immediately understanding the overall watershed and (inter-watershed) dynamics.

The Q3 Team's experience with advanced urban watershed modeling is second to none in Southern California with multiple projects completed similar to the Leucadia Area Watershed Mast Plan. Our experience is primarily in Southern California but does extend as far as New York, where the Q3 engineers were hand selected to model the impacts of coastal hurricane surges on the new World Trade Center campus as a result of Superstorm Sandy in 2012. Mr. Ryan led the modeling efforts for the linked 2-D surface and first of its kind 1-D analysis of the floors below the surface.

Watershed Bifurcation

Flat watersheds with minimal drainage facilities often contain issues of bifurcation (interconnecting runoff) during moderate to larger storm events. This is especially true in areas with no curb and gutter (like many areas within Encinitas). Past studies identified drainage boundaries to estimate peak runoff. A major issue with this method is, as flood levels rise, flows begin to mix with adjacent watersheds. Neglecting bifurcation

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can result in improvements that do not perform as anticipated. To develop a proposed flood solution, or "fix" in a sub-watershed may actually not perform as anticipated, due to bifurcation. Conversely, one area "fix" could benefit the local adjacent areas, but result in flood impacts downstream. For this reason, it is important to use a software capable of evaluating highly detailed 3-D surfaces. Similar to the work performed in the City of La Quinta and Grand Terrace, the Q3 team proposes to use XPSTORM (1-D/2-D) advanced software model. This model's 2-D engine uses the full St. Venant (or Shallow Flow) equations. Unlike PCSWMM, the model performs a full 2-D analysis, allowing the program to accurately model any split flows and the benefits and impacts associated with the recommended improvements.

Hydrologic Modeling Issues

In general, two hydrologic approaches are used in advanced 2-D modeling. One approach includes developing individual hydrographs and discharging them onto the 3-D surface. The other approach is to use the Distributed Rainfall Method, or (rain-on-grid). Similar to the watershed runoff bifurcation, the hydrologic model setup is important to produce accurate results.

Development of individual hydrographs for each sub catchment within a study area uses time-ofconcentration to determine intensity, and thus the peak flowrate. With flat areas, these calculations could lead to inaccurate flowrates or runoff estimations due to bifurcation. In addition, when using a individual hydrographs are discharged onto flat 3-D surfaces, the model results will show a "firehose" effect, which can produce false depths and velocities in the areas near or around the location of the hydrograph input.

To ensure a more realistic hydrologic approach, the O3 team proposes to use the Distributed Rainfall (or rain-on-grid) method to evaluate the two watersheds. Precipitation, loss rate calculations, and storm patterns will be based on the methods outlined in the San Diego County Hydrology Manual. Instead of manually delineating each sub-watershed, XPSTORM will distribute rainfall on the 3-D surface and allow the model to determine where the flow is conveyed. This approach is becoming the norm in urbanized watershed modeling in the United States. The Q3 Team has performed and validated this method with success on multiple projects including the Los Peñasquitos Watershed Master Plan, City of La Quinta Focused Area Drainage Study, City of Grand Terrace Focused Area Drainage Study, and the City of Laguna Beach Focused Area Drainage Study.

Model Calibration

With any advanced hydraulic modeling analysis, it is important to calibrate the findings to known flooding events. Even though the scoped storm events (5-, 10-, 50- and 100-year) are statistical events, a correlation can be created that will help verify the validity of the analysis results. This is performed for the existing conditions, before proposed improvements are analyzed. The Q3 team will utilized historical photographs to estimate depths for known storm events. Q3 will develop a model based on local rain gage data from a known storm event to compare to the historical photographs. From the photos,

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estimated maximum flood depths will be compared to the model maximum flood depths. The models will be "calibrated" until the results match the storm photos.

Limitations on Where to Discharge Stormwater

Within the two sub-watershed areas identified in this project, three main locations exist for discharging proposed storm drains: 1) the Batiquitos Lagoon; 2) the Pacific Ocean; and 3) Cottonwood Creek. Discharge into the Batiquitos Lagoon was previously restricted by the Coastal Commission to a 24-inch pipe. Boring a possible outlet pipe through the bluffs along the ocean was previously considered viable with respect to the Coastal Commission but would be costly and require a well-engineered and protected outfall structure to resist coastal erosion. Discharging into Cottonwood Creek was previously considered but contradicted Drainage Law.


It is imperative that each of the potential receiving waters' restrictions be understood prior to formulating a concept plan. The Q3 Team will focus on minimizing the outlet pipe sizes by optimizing the allowable surface flooding in areas that are not a hazard to life, property, or transportation. Concepts may include strategic LID or green facilities, optimizing/minimizing pipe sizes, and potentially conveying flows to Cottonwood Creek outlet in a manner that does not break Drainage Law.

Public Awareness

With the City's history of flooding, social media and local news coverage have contributed to a politically charged environment. This project will most likely be contensious, especially with respect to the residents

near the known flooded areas. The Q3 team are no strangers to polical projects and have had great success with public awareness using visual results and animations.

It will be important to communicate the findings of this study to the public and stakeholders. Our dealings with advanced models has helped us create a process as to how to explain complex results to nontechnical stakeholders. An example of our experience in public outreach was apparent with the success of our City of Redlands Focused Drainage Master Plan. Here, we

developed a 3-D animations showing the implications of various flood control alternatives, and gained the support of the (previously negative) City's Council and stakeholders.

As with all our complex watershed drainage projects, we will deliver the results of our advanced modeling study in a manner that is easy to understand by using animiations and/or graphics to tell the story of our findings and recommendations.

Aggressive Schedule

The project schedule will be crucial as concept plans must be completed for the North 101 (Leucadia Streetscape) project area by October 31. This deadline will mean that all existing condition and proposed condition hydraulics for this pilot project area must be complete. Detailed concept plans will need to be

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completed and coordinated with Michael Bakers' designs, all within approximately 2 months. The Q3 team will meet this deadline by performing this proposed pilot project as the priority. Q3 will work closely with our Michael Baker team members to ensure well vetted concepts are selected that conform to the proposed Streetscape designs. Michael Baker team members will develop the proposed alternatives in conjunction with their Streetscape project to expedite the submittal of this project.

Project Approach

The Q3 team has developed the following approach to complete the detailed scope of work outlined in the RFP based on similar successful past projects.

Data Acquisition and Review: Prior to commencing with the model setup, it is imperative to perform a detailed and thorough investigation of background information and data collection. This task is one of the most important, as it forms the foundation for the existing model development. In this task, the team will interview City staff regarding known flooded areas, coordinate with maintenance staff regarding pumping operations, and discover the City's primary objectives and criteria for this project. Other data from the City will include as-built plans, previous reports, GIS data, past project hurdles and regulatory issues/restrictions, storm photos/records, soils data and topographic data. The Q3 team will also interview City regarding past project alternatives and why some were not implemented. Included in these discussions will be discussions of past outfall locations and the past hurdles with each.

Other data will be acquired from public domain such as LiDAR topographic data (NOAA, 2014 USGS Survey), County drainage and watershed studies, groundwater information, and tidal data. The Q3 team will field truth data to identify all existing topographic data and storm drain infrastructure.

For the purpose of this study, drainage conduit sizes will be limited to greater than 18-inches, unless located within an area of concern. Field verification will include conduit identification, snapshot photos at locations where storm photos exist, and reviewing potential outfall location conditions.

Existing Conditions Model Development: The next phase will be to develop the Existing Conditions model. This task is the most important task with respect to modeling as it sets the bar for how accurate the project results will be. The more accurate the input data, the better the results will be. The Q3 team will process the USGS LiDAR data to create the 3-D surface for the proposed model. Processing the data will include adding break lines at locations where bridge crossing exist, or known barriers, such as the railroad tracks, or adding surface drainage features such as channels that may not show up on the topo.

Once the surface is processed, the 1-D elements are added. All existing storm drain information is added including surface channels, subsurface storm drains, pumps, restriction plates, and catch basins. Initial XPSTORM 1-D/2-D runs are performed using generic storms to evaluate the runoff characteristics on the 3-D surface. During this task, missing storm drain facilities or surface inaccuracies are usually flushed out. The initial results will be discussed with the City



Leucadia WS - XPSTORM (2D Only Test Run) used to Identify potential Bifurcation



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


staff to ensure areas of flooding identified in the model are accurate.

The Q3 team will then "validate" the existing conditions XPSTORM model by running it with a known storm event (based on local rain gage data) that also has photographic documentation of flooded areas. For example, photographs of the December 12, 2014 event will be used to correlate the results using rainfall data from a local rain gage for that particular event. The model will be evaluated and adjusted as necessary until the flooded depths in the model match that of the photo. The Q3 team will correlate up to 2 storm events to validate the model. Once the model has been validated, we will begin preparing the design hydrology models.

Hydrology: The Q3 team proposes to use a distributed rainfall method to develop the hydrology for each of the design storm events. If requested, Q3 can prepare models using standard methods (i.e. rational method followed by hydrograph methodology), but due to the flat nature of the watersheds, the rain-on-grid approach will model the surface flows more accurately.

Hydrology will be developed for the 5-, 10-, 50-, and 100-year events per the requirements in the RFP. Rainfall data will be used and loss rates will be calculated based on the San Diego Hydrology Manual. Losses will be subtracted from the gross rainfall data for each storm event. The net rainfall

will be used for the models, and no transmission losses (or travel way infiltration) will be accounted for. Q3 will develop one single area unit hydrograph for a large representative sub-watershed within the Leucadia area to compare against the distributed rainfall model runoff volume. This process assures that the runoff volumes produced by distributed rainfall method are the same as the traditional San Diego County single area unit hydrograph volume for the same area.

Proposed Drainage & Water Quality Improvements: Once the existing hydrology is complete, the 1-D/2-D hydrologic/hydraulic models will be run and flooded locations will be identified. These locations will be compiled in coordination with the City to ensure all prioritization criteria are followed. Selection and design criteria will be established for traditional drainage mitigation improvements, as well as green infrastructure improvements. From the existing condition model results, alternatives will be formulated and vetted. During this process, the Q3 team will evaluate and work with the City to review the current criteria for development within the areas of inundation and establish new criteria where needed.

Models of these alternatives will be prepared in XPSTORM. Based on the results, the Q3 team will formulate levels of hydraulic deficiency. This method is crucial and requires experience in understanding improvements in series. In some cases, upstream improvements may benefit downstream flooded areas, while in other cases, they may adversely impact downstream areas by shifting the flood to a different location. Our wholistic view of the watershed will allow us to identify and account for these conditions. During the identification and development of potential priority projects, our team will seek opportunities to incorporate green infrastructure or water quality BMPs as part of the solution.

Prioritization: The potential flood control mitigation sites will be prioritized based on criteria established by the City and the Q3 team. A decision matrix will be developed identifying and establishing a weight for each criterion within the matrix. The final matrix will reveal a list of priority projects. The priorities will also be divided into Extremely High Priority, High Priority, and Medium Priority. A color-coded map will be created for each of the two watersheds. Q3 prepared a similar prioritization ranking for both the City of Redlands and the City of Yucaipa master plans of drainage.

Project Concept Development: The top six (6) priority projects will be further developed. The

intent would be to select three (3) in each watershed, however, they can be adjusted based on the results of the prioritization matrix. Detailed conceptual plans will be prepared including 11x17 plan sheets, illustrations, and or renderings. The plans will show the recommended size, material, and location of improvements as well as connections to existing infrastructure and identification of existing utilities that may be in conflict with the proposed improvements. The plans and exhibits will also include information related to the benefits, costs, and constraints of the project. Information will be included as it pertains to community integration, such as future projects, landscaping and/or streetscape projects.

The North Coast Highway (101) will be evaluated thoroughly first to meet the October 31 deadline. Q3 will work directly with Michael Baker team members to vet potential flood control and water quality options that conform to the proposed Leucadia Streetscape design. Once the modeling is complete, the Q3 team will prepare the final project concepts for incorporation into the Streetscape designs.

Cost Estimate: The Q3 team will provide a rough order of magnitude cost estimate for each concept design. Unit prices will be based on recent project bid cost lists and coordinated with the City for final approval. The costs will be prepared and submitted to the City in Excel format.

Master Plan Document Development: The results of the study will be documented in a single report and include the methodologies, results, and recommendations. The report will include supporting calculations for the modeling as well as the cost estimates. Concept plans will be included in the report, as well as the priority drainage system map. It is anticipated that two submittals will be made, a draft submittal and a final submittal.

The Q3 team will work with the City ensure the final report conforms to the goals of the Climate Adaptation Plan for Transportation Networks in Leucadia (Transportation Adaptation Plan). Within this document, the Q3 team will identify and extrapolate on alternative benefits for potential stormwater harvesting, percolation, and water quality. Future climate change scenarios will be discussed with respect to the project alternatives. The conclusions, recommendations, and supporting calculations in the report can be used as a basis for future grant or capital funding request.

Council Approval: The final task for this project will be a series of presentations to gain acceptance for the project results and recommendations. It is anticipated that one presentation will be made to the City staff, and a final presentation to the City Council. The presentation will include the findings of the project including methodologies, assumptions, final concept projects, recommendations and conclusions. It is anticipated that a visual animation will be included as part of these presentations to help with the "public awareness" aspect of the project. This will also act as a tool to convey the technical aspects of the study to the stakeholders and non-technical audience.





Schedule

The Q3/Michael Baker Team will cost-effectively meet project objectives within the defined schedule so that solutions may be incorporated into the current design effort for the Leucadia Streetscape project. The following page presents our proposed schedule based upon our understanding of the scope of work.

The initial work on the project will focus on getting the information and completing the technical studies to identify potential drainage improvements for the Streetscape project. These items are identified by the RED bars on the attached schedule. Once the Streetscape projects are identified, the team will work to complete the entire study before the end of June 2020.

Cost Proposal

As requested, a Cost Proposal detailing hourly billing rates and estimated hours per task (organized by task and subtask as presented in the City's RFP) is provided under separate cover. This cost proposal is based on the scope of work provided by the City in the RFP. The costs are based on developing a total of **6 (six)** "pilot projects" or priority project; three in the Leucadia watershed, and three in the Old Encinitas watershed. Although after investigation and modeling, it may be found that more priority projects will be developed in the Leucadia watershed than the Old Encinitas.

The update included the evaluation of the existing watershed conditions to identify the deficiencies and flood prone areas. Q3 identified a set of potential alternatives and evaluated the effectiveness in the hydrology/hydraulic model. The results of the alternatives analysis runs were used to determine the most cost-effective solutions for the deficient areas. Alignments and facilities sizes were prepared for the recommended storm drain systems. A focused master plan update report is being prepared and processed for approval through the City.

La Quinta Focused Drainage Study, La Quinta CA. *City of La Quinta*. Project Manager responsible for the preparation of the hydrologic and hydraulic models that encompassed the majority of the City. The models were prepared using data from the 2014 storm event and flood depths in the model correlated to actual storm photos. The model was then used to identify drainage improvements in five locations within the City. Mr. Ryan and Mr. McCarthy were responsible for developing the design alternatives for four of the locations. The use of these models showed more realistic design alternatives than using standard H&H models.

Master Plan of Drainage, Redlands, CA. *City of Redlands.* Project Manager. The team identified existing drainage deficiencies and sizing for proposed replacement facilities to alleviate flooding for the designated storm events. Historical floods for the City of Redlands included more than three feet of runoff inundating the downtown portion of the city. As part of this project, a hydraulic model was prepared which

includes a fully hydrodynamic 2-dimensional analysis of the surface runoff, coupled with the subsurface facilities, which was used to identify the most feasible flood mitigation alternatives. A 3D animation was created to demonstrate the results of the downtown flooding (first of its kind for urban modeling) for review by stakeholders.

The outfall was at the ocean, which entailed a variable tide, which included storm surge. Provided the preliminary plans and cost estimates for a phased approach that would work with the City's budget.

At the 19-December-2019 City Council meeting I spoke about the silliness of the Agenda Item 10B. Amendment to Leucadia Streetscape Project (CS04D) Contract with Michael Baker International to add up to **\$676,000** to an existing multi-million dollar Streetscape project contract for design of a regional storm drain system being run by City Engineer Wimmer.

So, imagine my surprise to discover, on this 22-January-2020 agenda, an item simply called: **Sump and Inlet Project (CD17A & CD05E)**. I thought things would be exciting enough with just the homeless parking lot problem. It appears that the \$179K cost for this project can be funded by the Leucadia Flooding Issues Project (CD17A) and the Storm Drain Repair Project (CD05E): \$149K will come from Project CD17A and \$30K will come from Project CD05E.

My curiosity about this matter led me to an agenda report from the 18-April, 2018 City Council meeting has the subject line: Notice of Completion for the Leucadia Flooding Issues Sump Areas Phase II (CD17A). According to that report, ...the construction contract authorization was \$129K and the project construction cost is approximately \$126K. Any balance from the construction contract funds will remain in the Leucadia Flooding Issues Sump Locations Fund (CD17A). This was to construct nine storm water catch basin devices at locations determined by the Public Works Field Operations Division to collect the storm water runoff at existing sump locations. These catch basins do not connect to any existing storm drain lines and instead they leak into the groundwater through holes in them but require pumping out after storms with a truck.

That makes, 126 + 676 + 179 = \$981K on studies and throw-away system components related to Leucadia flooding and Streetscape that are inadequate or redundant respectively or both jointly yet still insufficient to properly address the stormwater problem. <u>And Voila</u>, that \$5M has already jumped to \$6M and it's only been a month.

So, as you can imagine, this raises a few questions:

- 1. How much money is in the CD17A fund, where is that documented and what won't be getting done in those projects in order to fund this one?
- 2. Why are you continuing to spend money on something that was not even mentioned in the December meeting about Leucadia flooding especially when these sumps are not connected to anything and is not even part of the supposed \$5M stormwater system begin planned for the additional \$667K added to Michael Baker last month (or perhaps the consultant forgot to mention it)?
- 3. What is the relationship of this expenditure to the other stormwater-related contracts that are being authorized but not publicly discussed? For example, what is the new construction doing that appears to be opening a stormwater outfall to Batiquitos Lagoon on the east side of HWY101 at the La Cost intersection? Is this funded by CD17A

or by what other funds?

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4. How much does it cost to pump out those sumps, what budget is it added to, and what happens to the water, where does it go?

In an effort to get you a brief response before I am out of the office for the majority of the rest of the week. Please see my responses to your questions below.

- 1. I had erroneously assumed that the COE was doing this work somehow. Since the COE is not doing this work, by what authority is the contractor putting a new storm drain into Batiquitos Lagoon? After consultation with Eric Becker, Senior Engineer with the Wetland Restoration and Protection Unit, the waters where the new storm drain pipe is being installed to discharge into Batiquitos Lagoon, is not occurring in jurisdictional waters. The ACOE has not deemed the waters federal jurisdictional waters, therefore the project does not need to get a section 404 permit and therefore our agency will not be issuing a 401 water quality certification. Therefore, the work to install the storm drain pipe.
- 2. Can a private contractor unilaterally put a storm drain into a coastal water body? I would expect installation of the storm drain to be a condition imposed on the Beach Resort Project by the City of Encinitas. I have requested my staff to review the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan for the Beach Resort construction project permitted under the Statewide Construction Storm Water Permit to assure that best management practices are identified and implemented during construction and installation of the pipe.
- 3. Does the MS4 permit cover such work by a private contractor? The Regional MS4 Permit requires the City of Encinitas to condition the Beach Resort project under the priority land development requirements to control pollutants and flow from the finished developed land. Also, the Regional MS4 Permit requires the City of Encinitas to control pollutant during the construction of the Beach Resort project by requiring implementation of best management practices as part of their jurisdictional runoff management program. The Beach Resort project is also covered under the Statewide General Construction Storm Water Permit overseen by my staff at the San Diego Water Board.

Once my staff engineer reviews the construction SWPPP on the Beach Resort to check for inclusion of the work to install the storm drain, I will get back to you. Again, thank you for your patience.

Dear Mr. Hitchens:

I am writing to object to any extension of CDP-#A-6-ENC-18-0019 (Leucadia Streetscape) Coastal Development Permit granted by the California Coastal Commission on October 11, 2018. There are three separate reasons that I object as detailed below. However, when considered jointly, these reasons interact to demonstrate a complete disregard by the City of Encinitas for the health and safety of the coast in both natural resources and the human community inhabiting it.

The City Council's actions fly in the face of the will of the community and proceed in fits and starts either out of incompetence or the intention to obscure a strategy that bypasses regulatory oversight through a series of incremental exceptions each of which claims to be innocuous yet that are cumulatively in violation of the principles of open government and environmental protection. I will provide a summary of that perspective after the individual reasons are enumerated below. It is difficult to come up with other explanations since most of this apparent deception pre-dates the COVID-19 effects on economic activity.

1 Streetscape EIR Documents Plan to Divert Stormwater into Groundwater

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


Figure 1: Leucadia Floodplain Map. Representative flood extent depicted here to display to approximate domain of typical flooding.

Streetscape is located directly in a flood zone that floods regularly as shown in Figures 1, 2, and 3. The hydrology section of the Streetscape EIR documents, as part of the basis for the original CDP, the construction of stormwater retention areas within parking areas alongside the railroad to facilitate the dispersion of stormwater into groundwater. This groundwater flows to the ocean bluffs (Figure 4) where it contributes to both upper and lower bluff erosion and failures (Figures 5, 6). Some of these failures have killed people (Coast News 2014, Coast News 2020, Newsbreak).

This stormwater is likely to be similar to the polluted runoff that flows to Cottonwood Creek (Figure 7). For example, from the City of Encinitas's Jurisdictional Runoff Management Program (January 2017) we already know that ... Cottonwood Creek is 303(d) listed

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for DDT, selenium, and sediment toxicity stressors. Further, the Pacific Ocean at Moonlight
 Beach, where Cottonwood Creek meets the ocean, is listed as a 303(d) impaired water body
 for total coliform bacteria. Encinitas Creek drains the north-central portion of the city and
 drains into Batiquitos Lagoon, which is designated a Critical Coastal Area in the State of
 California 2002 Critical Coastal Areas Strategic Plan. Encinitas Creek is 303(d) listed for

selenium and toxicity. Escondido Creek, 303(d) listed for DDT, enterococcus, fecal coliform, manganese, selenium, sulfates, total dissolved solids, total nitrogen, phosphate, and toxicity, drains the southern and northwest (Olivenhain) portion of the city and drains into the San Elijo Lagoon. San Elijo Lagoon is a 303(d) impaired water body listed for sediment/siltation, indicator bacteria, and eutrophic condition.

Furthermore, the United States Supreme Court has found that the United States Environmental Protection Agency Clean Water Act requirements cannot be bypassed merely by passing pollutants through groundwater, as was recently argued by the County of Maui and the Trump administration: ... The justices in a 6-3 opinion ruled that polluters must get permits for indirect water contamination that's the "functional equivalent" of a direct discharge into federal waterways. (Bloomberg News, 2020-04). This decision bears directly on the mis-management of stormwater in Encinitas generally and Leucadia specifically.

2 City of Encinitas Plans to Intentionally Divert Contaminated, Untreated Stormwater into Groundwater Leading to Pacific Ocean and Stormsewer Dumping into Batiquitos Lagoon as Part of the Streetscape Design

The City is planning to (1) build Streetscape which will not only increase impervious surface runoff but also intentionally (i.e., by design) divert, one might say inject, contaminated stormwater into groundwater that flows to the navigable waters of the Pacific Ocean; (2) build additional untreated outfall capacity into Batiquitos Lagoon to accommodate a 60-inch stormsewer that they are explicitly expediting to enable Streetscape to proceed as per public testimony in City Council meetings (Figures 2, 8); (3) build a railroad underpass at El Portal Street with the plan to pump it out when it floods in a manner similar to what is being done currently in other parts of Leucadia (Figure 9) without regard to any comprehensive and already overdue Leucadia Stormwater Master Plan. Some of the monies allocated to Streetscape are already being spent to develop this plan and the City has withheld the details from the public despite repeated entreaties to reveal the plans.

3 City of Encinitas Has Repeatedly Failed to Develop and Publicly Review A Stormwater Management Plan

During 2011-2012, the San Diego County Grand Jury recommended that the City Council of Encinitas take the actions to (1) develop an immediate plan to solve Leucadia's storm water flooding, (2) include storm water flow through the bluff at Leucadia Roadside Park as part of an overall storm drain fix, and (3) explore storm drain capital improvement tax funding for Leucadia via formation of a Special Assessment District.

At the time, a current city council member, Tony Kranz, ran for City Council on fixing drainage. In a city council meeting, Kranz requested that the San Diego Grand Jury finding

against Encinitas's handling of Leucadia storm drains be addressed and the public should be involved in the Encinitas response to the Grand Jury (Encinitas City Council Meeting, June 20, 2012). The grand jury findings and recommendations were ignored.

The current mayor and city council continue an erratic and difficult-to-understand pattern of behavior especially given Kranz's prior recognition of the problem. Consider the following:

- 1. North County Transit District indicated in a City Council meeting that it would not provide the permissions necessary for Streetscape to proceed unless the City of Encinitas (COE) did something about the flooding problems along the railroad tracks which threatened the ballast and the integrity of the right-of-way.
- 2. The COE contracted a company, Q3, to generate an engineering proposal based on stormwater modeling. The modeling was not fully revealed even through a public records act request and the COE insisted that Q3 provide early result to support Streetscape plan by Dec, 2019. It is questionable that any analysis was actually done as described in the Scope of Work of the contract.
- 3. There was no deliverable product but Q3 nonetheless provided an early recommendation, based on nothing publicly revealed, of a 60 inch stormsewer pipe to be installed to dump into Batiquitos Lagoon. When directly challenged about the assumptions used to come up with this recommendation and what the impacts would be on the Lagoon and the relevant MS4 permit requirements, the Q3 representative responded that most of a 1-year storm would never make it to the Lagoon but disperse in the soil '...just like it has always been done' (paraphrased but the testimony is in the video record of the COE council meetings).




Figure 3: History of precipitation in Leucadia. These data indicate a much higher frequency of flooding events than reportedly being addressed by the City of Encinitas's contractors.

- 4. The historical rainfall for Leucadia, Figure 3, can be seen to be more complicated and important to consider in any rational design process and not done in some slap-dash fashion to satisfy the whims of a pet project of the current council and mayor.
- 5. The COE made non-public changes to the stormsewer outfall in Batiquitos Lagoon under the cover of the Ponto hotel development (Figure 8). This work was interrupted by the RWQCB for failure to adhere to construction BMPs. The current outfall (Figure 11) may already be in violation of the Army Corps of Engineers criteria for navigable waters given the tidal flushing of the outfall stream.
- 6. Q3 was supposed to deliver a full report in August, 2020. That report has been deferred to Winter 2021 in a recent council meeting while the COE rushes forward the un-warranted development of the Streetscape project.
- 7. Streetscape 70% design was released with only a placeholder for the stormwater plans despite the early recommendation of a 60 inch stormsewer dumping into Batiquitos Lagoon.

The COE has now rolled all this into a contract with Michael Baker Company to proceed to develop Streetscape with incomplete plans, no publicly reviewable stormwater plan and every possible attempt to bypass regulatory oversight for a serious problem that even the

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Grand Jury could see 10 years ago. They are proceeding with the Phase I of an unreviewed, half-baked plan for a project that sacrifices the public interest for private gain and, unless you act to refuse this extension, with the explicit approval of the California Coastal Commission.

I respectfully request that you reject the request for an extension and, further, require that the City of Encinitas produce a publicly reviewed, CEQA-compliant stormwater plan and implement it before proceeding with the Streetscape project.




Figure 5: Upper bluff failure example A.




Figure 6: Upper bluff failure example B.




Figure 9: Current pumping approach of moving stormwater onto beach at Beacons Beach.

It is my understanding that your below email and request are in regard to the City of Encinitas 'North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' that proposes new stormwater pipeline infrastructure within the Streetscape project footprint.

City staff brought this project to Commission staff during a regularly-scheduled teleconference meeting on December 2, 2020. On this call, the City requested a determination by the Commission on whether they should proceed with the proposed 'North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' as an amendment to the Streetscape project, or to process the 'North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' as a new CDP. The City also asked about how to process modifications to the Streetscape project to include new stormwater facilities to support the proposed stormwater pipeline infrastructure.

On December 16, the Commission determined that the City should process this 'North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' as a new CDP (that would be appealable to the CCC as a major public works project), not as an amendment to the Streetscape project and not through substantial conformance with the Streetscape project. Commission staff did not think it was appropriate for the City to submit the 'North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' as an amendment to the Streetscape project because it is really a separate project from Streetscape, largely intended to convey stormwater rather than contribute to public access and transportation. However, Commission staff also let the City know that modifying the Streetscape project to include new stormwater treatment facilities to support the new pipe may need to be processed as an amendment to the Streetscape permit, rather than be included in the new Big Water project, but that CCC staff would need to see the proposed modifications before that determination could be made.

At this time, CCC staff understands that the City is pursuing the ''North Coast Highway 101 Drainage Improvement Project' as a separate, appealable CDP. Additionally, CCC staff has not yet seen information on the modifications that may be able to be included as an amendment to the Streetscape permit.

I will work with staff to compile your Public Records Act Request for all review materials and correspondence regarding this since 20-October-2020.

- 1. Q1) What do you mean no changes to the pipe outfalls? A1) There is no construction at the outfalls
- 517 2. Q2) How many pipes flow into the junction box and their diameters? A2) 1 pipe that's 66".
- 3. Q3) Any other inlets into the junction box? A3) No, just our pipe into the junction box there are inlet points along the 1.5 mile mainline?
- 4. Q4) Expected contaminant load in the stormwater? A4) This project adds BMPS on the 101 where none currently exist. It will be an improvement.
- 5. Q5) How much leaking around the new pipes? A5) These pipes are brand new, do not expect leaking.
- 6. Q6) Where does Vulcan drain? A6) This meeting is specific to the 101 drainage project. There are
 other projects that are looking at other aspects of Leucadia drainage.
- 7. Q7) What are the ramifications of this system on flooding along Vulcan? A7) This meeting is specific to the 101 drainage project. There are other projects that are looking at other aspects of Leucadia drainage.
- 8. Q8) Didn't we just put in a new junction box? A8) No, not here. We are currently preparing to put in
 a new system south of here from El Portal to A St as part of Leucadia Streetscape Phase 1.
- 9. Q9) What are the dates for full completion? A9) It depends on when City Council approves funding
 for the next phase. If it's approved with Streetscape Phase 2, it could start as early as July 2021. A
 next phase project could take 18 to 24 months.
- I0. Q10) Didn't we just put in a new pipes here? A10) The hotel project at the 101 and La Costa did do
 some work to accommodate the hotel site.
- 11. Q11) How we will address flooding now, before this project is complete? A11) No changes from the

- A34) The topography here trends north. So water that would already go into Batiquitos is now being pulled underground.

 G03 comes from Leucadia Roadway Park. This project is adding new stormdrains here to allow that water
 G04 to flow into our new stormdrain pipe and up north toward Ponto Beach.
- G05 36. Q36) If water will no longer be pumped to Beacon's isn't that more water into Batiquitos Lagoon?
 A36) If that water were allowed to pond, it would eventually make its way into the existing stormdrain
 system and outlet at Batiquitos Lagoon. In very large storm events, some water is diverted. In smaller
 events that water heads north currently.
- 37. Q37) What about the new water into Batiquitos Lagoon? A37) None of the first flush will go into the
 Lagoon, it will all be directed through BMPs and then treated water will typically go to Ponto, or in
 very large events it will go to Batiquitos Lagoon.
- G12 38. Q38) Is the water a safety problem on the 101? A38) Ponded water can present a safety hazard if
 G13 people aren't going slowly or navigating it responsibly. Neighbors along the 101 also experience
 G14 property damage from flooding that this project will address.
- G15 39. Q39) Will money from the hotel go to pay for the new drainage? A39) Staff is not aware of any
 G16 requirement for the City to obtain revenue from the new hotel for this project.
- 40. Q40) Have you done a Hydraulic analysis, where will the water go, will there be BMPs? A40) Yes,
 we have completed a hydrology and hydraulic study. All first flush water will go to Ponto beach. This
 project will have biofiltration, dispersion and landscaping as BMPs to filter the stormwater.
- 41. Q41) What is a very intense storm event? A41) Last year we have a 700-year storm event, or a storm
 that we expect to see once every 700 years or a 1 in 700 chance of a storm that size happening in any
 given year.
- 42. Q42) What is the impact to the bluff due to digging? A42) No impact to the bluff, the digging is
 all within the 101 or directly adjacent to the 101. We will have paleontology monitoring in case any
 artifacts are found.
- 43. Q43) Are we drawing an impact between Ponto and Batiquitos Lagoon outfalls. A43) Ponto outfalls
 have a series of detention basins that provide additional treatment at the outlet. Higher flows will go
 into Batiquitos Lagoon.

 project is mostly underground, with some drainage inlets no real opportunity for art. The larger
 Leucadia Streetscape project does have opportunities to incorporate art and unique features.

We haven't done very many Community participation meetings with zoom. So there's some growing pains and some challenges along the way and [00:00:32] we apologize that we're not able to be face-to-face with the pandemic ongoing. This is the safest For us to meet with

you guys and get your input. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the North 101 drainage project 667 specifically, [00:00:48] we understand that there are other drainage issues in the city of Encinitas and 668 in Leucadia, but this is specific to the improvements that were proposing tonight, which are on the 669 North 101 between [00:01:03] basil and la coste. So you can type questions in along the way into the 670 chat function if it's specific. to our particular slide number you'll see the page numbers at the bottom 671 right corner so you can see this is slide 4 [00:01:19] so you can type in slide for I have a question about 672 X Y or Z and then at the end of the presentation we'll have some time to go through those questions 673 and provide you some answers so again North Coast Highway 101 drainage improvements project 674 this is the the [00:01:34] items we're going to cover tonight so we'll talk about the project location 675 need for the project and overview opportunities and constraints hydrology and hydraulics concept plan 676 construction methods environmental analysis project [00:01:49] benefits and then a potential project 677 schedule to move this forward 678

2. Speaker 1: So this is the North End of Leucadia the green area. You see shaded there represents all 679 the area that drains to Highway 101 [00:02:04] currently. So it is the area that is west of the NCD 680 tracks south of La Costa north of Basil Street. So why do we need this project? So if you're familiar 681 [00:02:19] with the 101 you drive the 101 you're familiar with what happens out there. So during 682 moderate or heavy rain storms. We get ponding on the 101 which impacts the vehicular traveler 683 cyclists pedestrians residents [00:02:34] and the businesses in the area. So we're looking for a way 684 to alleviate the flooding along the 101. So then what is our project going to be so between basil and 685 the cost is approximately 1.5 miles. So we're looking to add 1.5 [00:02:49] miles of a new storm 686 drain main line with additional inlets and connections along the way to gather the runoff that ponds 687 currently at low spots throughout that Corridor. So we'll create larger inlets to get the the [00:03:04] 688 water and the runoff off the roadway quickly new inlets at Leucadia roadside Park. Where we have a 689 big ponding problem during most random events, and we'll be adding Green Street improvements to 690 improve water quality. So the inlets [00:03:19] that are in there in the 101 currently are decades old. 691 They don't have any best management practices for stormwater. So this will be an improvement to 692 the water quality in this area as well. And then we're not going to change the existing pipe [00:03:34] 693 out Falls. So all of this water currently drains to the north through existing pipes. And we're going 694 to keep those pipe Outlets the same. So when undertaking this project we wanted to look at the 695 opportunities and constraints [00:03:49] or challenges for this project. So we see an opportunity to 696 reduce flooding along the 101 to add new stormwater treatment to the runoff an opportunity is that 697 the project is entirely within city right of way. We don't need to get [00:04:04] any new easements 698 right of way to construct this project. And the new hotel project just built an energy dissipator for 699 stormwater runoff at the North End of the project. So we'll be able to use that new facility [00:04:19] 700 in conjunction with this project that we're planning and then what are the constraints for the project? 701 So we have existing utilities that are underground that we need to understand there's their location 702 and make sure that our alignment doesn't impact them or [00:04:34] figure out where they need to be 703 relocated. There's traffic so Our intent of course is to construct this drainage in the in the highway. So 704 there will be impacts to traffic as the project is constructed and along with that [00:04:49] one with 705 any construction project on the 101. There will be impacts to the businesses and residents. But of 706 course our hope is having the short-term impact to those businesses and residents will have a long-707 term benefit as we address the flooding there. The pipe [00:05:04] will be relatively deep 25 feet or 708 so, and it's very deepest. Just so that presents some challenges particularly with groundwater you're 709 digging that deep. You may have kind of a wet excavation which makes it more challenging and there 710 might be sandy soil, which [00:05:19] is also challenging to excavate in 711

3. Speaker 2: So what do we do to figure out how to size the pipes in the area? So first we had to look

at hydrology and hydrology is basically trying to understand how much [00:05:34] water is coming 713 into the area that we need to capture. So as I mentioned before and I showed in a previous slide 714 that green highlighted area is about 200 Acres. So that's the tributary area all that all the rain that 715 [00:05:49] falls in that green polygons flows down to the 101 and Needs to be captured next we look 716 at I intensity duration and frequency curves. So looking at what is the intensity of a storm that we 717 expect to [00:06:04] get in this area duration. How long do we expect it to rain that hard and frequency. 718 Are we looking to address a storm that would happen once a year once every 15 years once every 25 719 years once every hundred years and then finally by [00:06:19] combining that information were able 720 to calculate the runoff. Volume that we need to capture and get off the roadway. So now that we have 721 our volume of water that we need to capture then we went into our hydraulic design [00:06:34] which 722 is figuring out what pipe sizes we needed in order to convey the water off of the 101 and Outlet. So 723 as I mentioned before we're not going to have any changes to the out Falls, what we're going to do 724 is provide big new pipes under the 101 [00:06:49] and they range in diameter from 36 inches all the 725 way up to 66 inches and that's meant to pull the water quickly off of the 101. Store it underground 726 and then it will be metered at the outlet because the outlets are a smaller [00:07:04] diameter pipe so 727 that that additional large-diameter pipe will store some of that water instead of having it sit on the 728 roadway. It'll be stored underground in the new pipes. 729

4. Speaker 1: So this [00:07:19] is a concept plan of our proposed project. You can see the different 730 colors along the 101 they represent the different main line. Pipe sizes. So it starts off at 36 inches 731 down by Basil Street increases to 48 [00:07:34] inches at Cadmus at Leucadia Boulevard. We're 732 accepting all the water from the Leucadia roadside Park. So we need a larger diameter pipe. So it's 733 60 inches between Leucadia to a little bit north of more gate and then at the very end, we need a small 734 section [00:07:49] of 66 inch pipe. And then the little inset that you see here is a junction structure 735 where we have some pipes coming together and then out letting in different directions. So it's the the 736 outlet so that the [00:08:04] smaller smaller storms with not that much water those all go to the West 737 towards Ponto Beach and then when we have very large storms that Junction structure will fill up with 738 water and it may Outlet [00:08:19] to the Sea. east side of the 101 739

5. Speaker 1: So then a question that comes up is how are we going to install this this new Pipeline? 740 And really that's up to the contractor. [00:08:34] What we'll do is if this project were approved 741 742 and we get all our permits when we put the project out to bid the lowest responsible and responsive construction contractor will tell us how he proposes to construct it. So there's two typical methods 743 [00:08:49] that we see one is open trench and that's the picture on the top to the Left that's your 744 standard construction method. It's typically less expensive. It may take more time than the other 745 method. We're going to discuss and then when we have challenging soils, [00:09:04] it's it can be 746 more difficult and take a little bit more time. The other option you see at the lower right is micro 747 tunneling that uses a specialized construction equipment and techniques where you're boring under 748 [00:09:19] the soil. So you have an opening at the beginning of the pipe and opening a little bit further 749 down and you're going to basically kind of push that pipe from one end to the other. It can be more 750 expensive. It's typically a faster installation, but it can be harder [00:09:34] to identify conflict. So 751 you may not know if there's a big rock in the way or if there's a utility that wasn't identified until 752 you hit it. So those are a couple of different construction methods that are available. [00:09:49] So 753 after we set our alignment and our inlets and our pipe, we did an initial environmental analysis of 754 the alignment. So we looked at biology water quality and paleontology. [00:10:05] So for biology, 755 we identify the existing biological resources, we looked at birds and plants and fish and any kind of 756 species that may be out there including listed species or species [00:10:20] of particular concern and 757 then we reviewed the potential impacts to any of the biological resources out there. Speaker 1: [00:10:52] next we looked at water quality so we took a look at the pre and post project 763 conditions and then we evaluated potential impacts to water bodies surface water Wetlands this project 764 was designed to meet the regional water [00:11:07] quality control board's standards and requirements 765 so by adhering to those standards are designed does not have any adverse impacts on water quality 766 next we looked at the paleontology [00:11:22] of the area so we identified the geological units that 767 may be impacted so there's a Bay Point formation that will impact through at least probably half of 768 the project [00:11:37] from the midpoint North and then in the very deepest parts we may also impact 769 the Santiago formation which is which underlies the Bay Point formation so in our very deepest 770 excavations we may encounter Sure, those formations.  splits into three different pipes which again you can see kind of in this little [00:15:39] graphic down
 here. And the next question was does the junction box have additional inlets that will not be occupied
 by this project.

- Speaker 1: No, there are no additional Inlet. [00:15:54] So again, we've got 77 inlets through this
 entire one and a half mile stretch that all dumped into that 36 or 48 or 60 or 66 inch pipe and then
 those all come together and then they enter [00:16:09] that junction box and then exit in three different
 locations.
- Speaker 2: Okay, and the next one the same gentleman. What is the expected contaminant load in the
 storm water? Um, I'm

14. Speaker 1: not [00:16:24] sure I mean, I can't quantify that but the Improvement that you'll see here 816 is that currently with the there are two existing storm drains out there. There's an 18 inch storm 817 drain and a 24-inch storm drain [00:16:39] that are currently draining the 101 and they don't have 818 any stormwater best management practices. So we have a requirement by the regional board when we 819 have a project like this. That we need to include stormwater [00:16:54] best management practices. 820 So the benefit of this project is we will have dispersion areas and Landscape areas and biofiltration 821 areas that will filter out some of those pollutants after the project there right now are just going into 822 the pipe [00:17:09] and being Outlet. 823

- 15. Speaker 2: Thank you. And then the next question is how much the storm water will leach into the
 ground around the pipe.
- 16. Speaker 1: And so this will be a brand-new system. So we don't expect [00:17:24] there to be any pipe failures, you know, we'll have to manage it manage and monitor our inspection carefully and closely but this is a deep excavation. So we are going to take great care to not have to go back out there and address any kind [00:17:39] of failures or leaks or anything like that but brand-new system.
 We don't anticipate there will be leaking at the pipe.
- 17. Speaker 2: thank you and then new gentlemen Paul black colleges are pronouncing that correctly
 [00:17:54] but what about drainage from Vulcan where would folk and rain
- 18. Speaker 1: so Logan is a separate tributary area I know we have other projects in development that
 are looking at the Leucadia area as a whole [00:18:09] so I don't have any information on that project
 tonight we're here to address and answer questions that are specific to the 101
- 19. Speaker 2: drainage thank you and then it's diet and soon as I glue and then what are the ramifications
 of this proposed system on the flooding [00:18:24] and ponding on Bowden Avenue
- Speaker 1: So this is a project to address the flooding on the 101. So it will not have an appreciable
 impact on
- Speaker 2: Vulcan. And then [00:18:39] another question from John from the original questions
 having you just put in a new junction
- Speaker 1: box. We have not so there is a product that's out in construction. Now that's [00:18:54]
 located a streetscape phase 1 and that's putting in a new storm drain from Basel strength South to a

- street. So we put in a new larger storm drain system at the south end of leukemia, but this would be a new [00:19:09] there is known other new Junction structure in this
- Speaker 2: area. And we have a question from jar which may need some clarification but it is asking
 what do you mean here now? I'm sure [00:19:24] what that was rough.

- Speaker 2: Next one is from Tim. One of the proximate dates for full completion. I'm aware you
 mentioned summer 2021 for phase two [00:19:39] but just general approximate dates for completion.

 for the next fiscal year and [00:19:54] the fiscal year beyond that so they will set the priorities and

 that's out there now that's putting in new pipes from Basel South to a street that work has an actually
 begun yet or perhaps what what they're referring to is when the hotel project came in that's [00:20:55]
 right at the North End of the 101 by La coste that project did some To work, but that was not a city
 project that was drainage work to accommodate the hotel site.
- Speaker 2: And then we have a question from Tim again looks like in the meantime [00:21:10] what
 are their current plans to address kind of current flooding conditions while we process any projects.

- 40. Speaker 1: so I know there's a sluice gate that can bring water across from the Vulcan side to the 101 side [00:24:28] that is being addressed in the project. That is the phase one of Leucadia streetscapes.

There's a 1088 dissipator structure there. So you don't have water quality impacts because that water coming out has 1089 already been treated that first flush. So it's clean water coming in. So the amount of water [00:45:24] 1090 doesn't necessarily impact. You know, what what our study design was here because that's all coming 1091 out of flow that is not creating a erosion it is not impacting the biological construct of the Lagoon in 1092 [00:45:39] this area with regard to eelgrass cord grass and some of the other some of the endangered 1093 species that rely on this habitat so yes there is an increase in flow during very intense storm events that 1094 will come out of the [00:45:54] existing pipe again no changes to that outfall pipe but it is clean water 1095 that is coming out in a volume that is not going to affect any of the biology habitat water quality or 1096 otherwise in this area [00:46:10] Okay and then next question has the water been a danger for Autos 1097 Etc now that we have bumps and 35 miles per hour is is more of the real problem as has a screen 1098 scrape a requirement [00:46:25] to the city where the city dog Payne Revenue From new hotel and 1099 additional one to come. 1100

Hi Roy,

Staff believes that the City should process the 'Big Water' project as a new CDP (that would be appealable to the CCC as a major public works project), not as an amendment and not through substantial conformance with the Streetscape project. At this time, staff also requests that all technical documents associated with this project (Paleontology, Marine Biology, Water Quality, Hydrology, etc.) be provided as they become available, so that we can get the documents into our Technical Staff's queue for review as soon as possible.

Staff does not think that it is appropriate to submit the Big Water project as an amendment to the Streetscape project because we see it as a separate project, largely intended to convey stormwater, rather than contribute to public access and transportation. However, modifying the Streetscape project to include new stormwater treatment facilities to support the new pipe may need to be processed as an amendment to the Streetscape permit, rather than be included in the new Big Water project, but we will need to see the proposed modifications before we can make that determination. Lastly, staff would like to work with City staff early on to resolve any potential issues with the Big Water project before the appeal period opens, so please provide updates and any questions as they arise for staff review.

Fourth Amendment to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees Memorandum of Understanding

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS:

1. Adopt Resolution 2019-65, approving the Fourth Amendment to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees Memorandum of Understanding, and authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This project aligns with the Strategic Plan Vision for:

• Environment - Be good stewards of open spaces, beaches, parks, and the natural environment.

FISCAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The fiscal impact associated with the Staff recommendation is \$29,029, which is the City of Encinitas portion of Regional General Program and Carlsbad Watershed Shared Costs for FY 2019-2020. Future cost estimates included in the MOU show an increase in Regional Program and Carlsbad Watershed shared costs. Adequate funds have been included in the FY 2019-2020 and FY 2020-2021 operating budgets for the City's share of Regional General Program and Carlsbad Watershed shared costs. Projected expenditures for FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-2023 will be included in future operating budgets.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Encinitas is regulated by the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, San Diego Region (San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board) National Pollutant Discharge

Elimination System (NPDES) Order No, R9-2013-0001, as amended by NPDES Order Nos. R9-2015-01, and R9-2015-0100 (San Diego Region Municipal Stormwater Permit or Permit). The Permit is issued to 21 agencies (collectively termed "Copermittees") in the region, including the City of Encinitas. The Permit requires the City to collaborate with Copermittees on a variety of mandated regional and watershed based programs.

Regional programs include implementation and maintenance of the Project Clean Water website, a web-based regional clearinghouse that provides a centralized point of access to water quality information and resources for San Diego County; regional education and outreach programs; regional membership in the California Stormwater Quality Association; regional studies; and regulatory reports, including regional monitoring and long-term assessment reports.

Watershed programs involve Copermittees located within the same watershed management area. The City of Encinitas is located entirely within the Carlsbad Watershed Management Area (WMA) along with the County of San Diego and the Cities of Carlsbad, Escondido, Oceanside, San Marcos, Solana Beach, and Vista. Watershed programs include the development of a Water Quality Improvement Plan (WQIP), which is a strategic watershed-based plan intended to guide local programs toward addressing the highest priority pollutants identified in the watershed; WQIP Annual Reports; and monitoring of storm drain discharges and receiving waters within the WMA.

On December 12, 2007, City Council adopted Resolution No. 2007-50, approving a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees. This MOU was entered into by the County of San Diego, the San Diego Unified Port District, the San Diego County Regional Airport Authority, and the Cities of Carlsbad, Chula Vista, Coronado, Del Mar, El Cajon, Encinitas, Escondido, Imperial Beach, La Mesa, Lemon Grove, National City, Oceanside, Poway, San Diego Municipal Stormwater Permit, Order No. R9-2007-0001 (2007 Permit). This MOU established a management structure, cost sharing mechanism, and fulfilled general program obligations related to permit requirements. General program budgets and expenditures are approved each fiscal year by the MOU voting body, which includes the City of Encinitas.

On May 19, 2010, City Council adopted Resolution No. 2010-29, approving the First Amendment to the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU. The First Amendment simply provided clarification to the Copermittees on the terms and conditions for crediting excess funds from one agreement year to the next.

On June 25, 2014, City Council adopted Resolution No. 2014-47, approving the Second Amendment to the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU. The Second Amendment provided clarification to Copermittee participation requirements, clarification of effective date and termination date, and clarification of conditions of breach of the MOU.

On October 25, 2015, City Council adopted Resolution 2015-73, approving the Third Amendment to the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU. The Third Amendment to the MOU (Attachment 1) allowed the Copermittees to continue sharing regional general program costs to meet requirements defined by the new Municipal Stormwater Permit, Order No. 2013-0001 (2013 Permit), which became effective on June 27, 2013. The Third Amendment to the MOU also

provided a mechanism for cost sharing of watershed general programs that are required by the 2013 Permit, but were not previously required by the 2007 Permit.

¹³¹⁶ ANALYSIS:

The Fourth Amendment to the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU allows Copermittees to continue sharing costs and realize significant economies of scale towards Permit compliance as required through the remainder of the current Permit term, or until a superseding NPDES Order is adopted by the San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board. Other notable changes in the Fourth Amendment to the San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU include:

- Extension of the MOU through August 2024, or with the life of the current Permit plus 12 months, whichever is longer.
- Language clarifying Copermittee discretion over determination of a new Permit, prior to or after May 2024. (Which may trigger another MOU amendment, at the discretion of the Copermittee)
- Removal of reference to workgroups in order to clarify that those groups are not legislative bodies established by the Regional Stormwater Management Committee.
- Clarification that annual budgets for each fiscal year are subject to approval by the Copermittee governing bodies as part of their annual budgeting process.
- Language clarifying that the Shared Cost Budget authorized under this MOU is a "not to exceed" limit, representing the maximum amount that may be cost-shared for each spending category for the duration of the MOU. These limits do not represent funding commitments.

The County of San Diego has prepared this Fourth Amendment to the MOU (as well as all prior versions), and it is being considered by all Copermittees for approval and/or adoption as applicable. The City Attorney has reviewed the Fourth Amendment to the MOU and made no recommendations for change.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The action being considered by the City Council is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because it is not a "project" under Section 15378(b)(5) of CEQA Guidelines. The action involves an organizational or administrative activity of government that will not result in the direct or indirect physical change in the environment.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

2019

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), entered into by the County of San Diego (County), the San Diego Unified Port District (Port), the San Diego County Regional Airport Authority (Airport), and the incorporated cities of San Diego, Carlsbad, Chula Vista, Coronado, Escondido, Imperial Beach, La Mesa, San Marcos, Del Mar, El Cajon, Encinitas, Lemon Grove, National City, Oceanside, Poway, Santee, Solana Beach, and Vista (Cities), collectively called Copermittees, establishes the shared program responsibilities of each party with respect to compliance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) stormwater permit regulations administered by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) under the authority granted by the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (Clean Water Act) 33 USCA 1251 et seq. as amended.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, in 1987 Congress amended Section 402 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 USCA §1342p) to require the U.S. EPA to promulgate regulations for applications for permits for stormwater discharges; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. EPA adopted final permit regulations on November 16, 1990; and

WHEREAS, these permit regulations require the control of pollutants from stormwater discharges by requiring an NPDES permit, which would allow the lawful discharge of stormwater into waters of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the County, the Port, the Airport, and the Cities desire to implement an integrated stormwater management program with the objective of improving surface water quality in the County of San Diego, but do so without waiving and expressly subject to any and all objections and appeals made by any Copermittee in response to any NPDES Permit; and

WHEREAS, the California State Water Resources Control Board (CSWRCB) as designee of the U.S. EPA has delegated authority to the San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board (Regional Board) for administration of the NPDES stormwater permit within the boundaries of its region; and

WHEREAS, on, May 8, 2013, the Regional Board issued an NPDES permit as Order No. R9-2013-0001, as amended by Order Nos. R9-2015-0001 and R9-2015-0100, NPDES No. CAS0109266, (Permit) governing waste discharge requirements for stormwater and urban runoff from the County, the Port, the Airport, and the Cities, naming these entities as Copermittees; and

WHEREAS, said Permit requires that the Copermittees cooperate in the implementation of various Urban Runoff Management Plans;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU - 1 -

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1318 I. DEFINITIONS

At Large means representing all of the Copermittees of this MOU.

Chair means presiding over and providing leadership and direction to a Working Body. This includes serving as a point of contact to external entities such as Regional Board staff, stakeholders, and industry groups, soliciting group input on and developing meeting content, facilitating meetings, and coordinating with the Secretary or Working Body Support staff to finalize work products for distribution to the Working Body. Chair responsibilities may also be divided between Co-Chairs.

Contract Administration means developing, soliciting, awarding, and managing contracts.

Consensus means general agreement reached between the participants of a Working Body.

Direct Costs mean those costs directly related to the development of a work product, or to the performance of a particular function or service. Direct Costs may include the wages of Copermittee employees engaged in an activity and the cost of materials or supplies needed to support that activity. Depreciation, equipment, and office space are not considered Direct Costs.

Fiscal Year starts on July 1 and ends on June 30 of the following year.

General Programs are collaborative urban runoff management activities which are (1) mandated by or necessary to implement requirements of the Permit, (2) necessary to anticipate the requirements, or prepare for renewal, of the Permit, (3) required to comply with Regional Board Orders or other directives required of Copermittees as dischargers of urban runoff (e.g., 13267 Orders, Total Maximum Daily Loads, etc.), or (4) other urban runoff management activities conducted with the unanimous approval of Copermittees sharing the cost or responsibility.

In-kind Contribution means a non-monetary contribution that can be used to satisfy an equivalent monetary obligation. Examples of In-kind Contributions are equipment or services provided for use.

Program Planning Subcommittee or Planning Subcommittee is composed as described in Section III.C.4 and 5.

Regional General Program(s) are activities that apply to all Copermittees, or that provide a regional benefit to Copermittees as determined by the Regional Management Committee.

Regional Principal Permittee is the County of San Diego unless another Regional Principal Permittee is selected in accordance with Section III.B.5. In addition to the responsibilities of all Copermittees described in Section II, the Regional Principal Permittee provides general coordination for the development and implementation of Regional General Programs, including the specific tasks and responsibilities described in Section III.A.1.b.

Regional Stormwater Management Committee or Management Committee is composed as described in Section III.B.2.

Regional Work Plan is a work plan that is one or more of the following: (1) developed and adopted annually for the purpose of conducting regional business to implement requirements of the Permit, (2) necessary to anticipate the requirements, or prepare for renewal, of the Permit, (3) required to comply with Regional Board Orders or other directives required of Copermittees as dischargers of urban runoff (e.g., 13267 Orders, Total Maximum Daily Loads, etc.), or (4) other urban runoff management activities conducted with the unanimous approval of Copermittees sharing the cost or responsibility.

Representative means a Copermittee staff member or consultant who serves as a point of contact and/or participant in the activities of a Working Body on behalf of the Copermittee. Except as described in Section III.B (Regional Stormwater Management Committee), Representatives are not required to attend meetings, but are expected to maintain a reasonable knowledge of, and involvement in, the activities of

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the Working Body. To the best of their ability each Copermittee Representative should have expertise and knowledge in the subject matter of each applicable Working Body.

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Secretary means a person who takes responsibility for the records, correspondence, minutes or notes of meetings, and related affairs of a Working Body. This includes: maintaining group contact lists; preparing and sending out meeting notifications and agendas; arranging for meeting rooms and equipment; taking, preparing, and finalizing meeting minutes or notes; and, coordinating with the Chair or Working Body Support staff to organize and distribute work products to the Working Body.

Simple Majority means at least one-half (50%) of applicable Copermittees, rounded up to the nearest integer, or plus one where the number of Copermittees is even. For the purposes of this MOU, a simple majority may never be less than three Copermittees.

Shared Cost Budget is one that is agreed upon and shared by Copermittees for the purpose of conducting stormwater regulatory activities, and can be developed at a watershed, regional or other scale.

Special Formula means any cost share formula that differs from the Default Formula in the selection or weighting of individual factors or in the methodology used to calculate one or more of them.

Three-fourths Majority means at least three-fourths (75%) of applicable Copermittees, rounded up to the nearest integer. For the purposes of this MOU, a Three-fourths Majority may never be less than three Copermittees.

Two-thirds Majority means at least two-thirds (67%) of applicable Copermittees, rounded up to the nearest integer. For the purposes of this MOU, a Two-thirds Majority may never be less than three Copermittees.

Urbanized Land Area means the total of all SANDAG land uses within the geographic area, subject to the cost share, excepting therefrom, the following coded land uses: 1403 Military Barracks; 4102 Military Airports; 6700 Military Use; 6701 Military Use; 6702 Military Training; 6703 Military Weapons; 7209 Casinos; 7603 Open Space Reserves, Preserves; 7609 Undevelopable Natural Areas; 9200 Water; 9201 Bays, Lagoons; 9202 Inland Water; and 9300 Indian Reservations.

Watershed Copermittee means any Copermittee that is identified both as a Copermittee under Table 1.a and a Responsible Copermittee under any Watershed Management Area as defined in Table B-1 of the Permit.

Watershed General Programs are activities that apply to the Copermittees comprising any individual Watershed Management Area (WMA) defined in Table B-1 of the Permit, or providing a general benefit to Copermittees within the WMA as determined by a Working Body.

Working Body means Committees, Subcommittees, Sub-working body(s), or any other working group of Copermittees' employees assembled to conduct specific tasks required by, for, or in furtherance of, compliance with the Permit.

II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF ALL COPERMITTEES

The following apply to General Programs.

A. Performance and Reimbursement of Tasks

1. Any individual Copermittee performing tasks necessary to fulfill budgeted General Program responsibilities for a Working Body is entitled to reimbursement of the costs incurred in accordance with section II.B.

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- 2. Any Copermittee performing contract administration tasks to fulfill budgeted General Program responsibilities for a Working Body is entitled to reimbursement of contract management costs at a rate of 5% of the total contract cost or as otherwise agreed on by the participating Copermittees.
- 3. Any Copermittee performing tasks other than contract administration or voluntarily serving as a Working Body Chair, Co-chair, or Secretary, is entitled to reimbursement of the Direct Costs of performing those services in accordance with section II.B.
- 4. A Copermittee shall not be obliged to conduct work, enter into any contract, continue with any work or contract, or incur any other cost on behalf of other Copermittees if each Copermittee has not contributed the funds that it is obliged to contribute toward the activity or program, or if the Copermittee has not received adequate assurances that such funds will be received before payments become due. The Copermittee shall have sole discretion to determine whether assurances that require funds will be timely received or adequate.
- 5. A member of a Working Body providing Working Body Support may terminate those obligations for convenience, but shall first make a good faith effort to carry out or transfer existing responsibilities to another party by providing written notification of termination to the Copermittees within the Working Body 90 days prior to the intended date of termination.

B. Fiscal Responsibilities

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- 1. Division of Shared General Program Costs
 - a. Prior to the allocation of shared costs, each proposed or approved budget task or sub-task shall be identified as either a Regional General Program cost or a Watershed General Program cost, and the Copermittees sharing that cost shall be identified. The cost of any particular budget element shall be subject to the approval of only the Copermittees to which it applies. The associated costs shall be divided among participating Copermittees as described below.
 - <u>Default Formula</u>. Shared costs shall be divided according to a Default Formula of 45% Urbanized Land Area, 45% Population, and 10% Equal Division unless a Special Formula is approved by the Copermittees to which the cost applies.
 - (a) Population costs shall be divided among the Copermittees as follows: Whenever any geographic portion of the Port or Airport jurisdiction(s), respectively, lies(s) within the geographic area to which the shared program or activity is applicable, the Port or Airport, respectively, will each pay a fixed 0.5% of total Population costs. The remaining percentage of the population costs shall be divided among Copermittees by dividing the total population of each Copermittee by the combined total Copermittee population within the geographic area applicable to the shared program or activity. These percentages shall be calculated using the most recently available population data available from the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), unless more recent data are available from an equivalent source such as the U.S. Census Bureau, and are determined to be acceptable by the Copermittees sharing the cost.
 - (b) Urbanized Land Area costs shall be divided among Copermittees by dividing the total Urbanized Land Area of each Copermittee by the combined total Urbanized Land Area of all participating Copermittees within the geographic area applicable to the shared program or activity. Urbanized Land Area shares shall be calculated using the most recently available San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) land use statistics. The Urbanized Land Area share

for the County shall include those urbanized lands in the unincorporated portion of the County that are west of the County Water Authority (CWA) service area boundary as it exists on the date of this MOU or as formally amended by the CWA.

- (c) Ten Percent (10%) of the total cost to be shared shall be divided equally amongst all of the Copermittees.
- (d) Modification of the Default Formula requires the unanimous vote of all Copermittees. For cost sharing that applies only to a group that contains fewer than all Copermittees, a unanimous vote is required of all affected Copermittees.
- (2) <u>Special Formulas.</u>

Special Formulas may be applied to any shared Regional or Watershed General Program cost, and require the unanimous vote of the Copermittees participating in the cost.

- (3) <u>In-kind Contributions</u>. Subject to approval by the Copermittees participating in a particular shared General Program budget, a Copermittee may provide an in-kind contribution of equal value rather than a monetary contribution toward all or part of the cost of an activity. Copermittee in-kind contributions may include Working Body Support.
- 2. Work Plans and Shared Cost Budgets
 - a. Limitations on Cost-sharing

General Program activities that may be cost-shared by the Copermittees include collaborative urban runoff management activities which are

(1) mandated by or necessary to implement requirements of the Permit,

(2) necessary to anticipate the requirements, or prepare for renewal, of the Permit, (3) required to comply with Regional Board Orders or other directives required of Copermittees as dischargers of urban runoff (e.g., 13267 Orders, Total Maximum Daily Loads, etc.), or

(4) other urban runoff management activities conducted with the unanimous approval of Copermittees sharing the cost or responsibility.

Examples of such activities include:

- (1) Development or implementation of any program requirements of the MS4 Permit, such as, the BMP Design Manual, regional education and outreach, or Water Quality Improvement Plans;
- (2) Public participation activities, such as facilitating public meetings and workshops;
- (3) Program assessment;
- (4) Plan updates;
- (5) Water quality monitoring, assessment and reporting;
- (6) Annual reporting, including establishment and management of data and information clearinghouses;

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- (7) Preparation of technical analyses, recommendations and comments regarding the MS4 Permit, total maximum daily loads, and other relevant storm water quality regulations;
- (8) Preparation of documents required by the MS4 Permit, such as Reports of Waste Discharge; and
- (9) Special studies related to storm water quality-related pollutants, their sources, and potential best management practices.
- b. Work Plans and Shared Cost Budgets
 - 1. **No later than October 31st of each year**, each Working Body shall prepare and submit to the Planning Subcommittee a proposed Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget for the upcoming Fiscal Year.
 - 2. Each Work Plan shall identify the parties that will serve as a Working Body Chair, Cochair, or Secretary for the upcoming Fiscal Year. These assignments will be served on a fiscal year basis, and shall be for a minimum term of one year.
 - 3. A Copermittee may not be compelled to act, or continue acting, as a Working Body Chair, Co-chair, or Secretary, and may at any time terminate an existing assignment. Before doing so, the Copermittee shall first make a good faith effort to carry out or transfer existing responsibilities.
 - 4. Each budget shall describe major tasks, schedules, and projected costs, which Copermittees will provide Working Body Support, Contract Administration, in-kind contributions, and any other information applicable to regional general program costs.
 - 5. To ensure that each Copermittee governing body has sufficient time to consider fiscal impacts, the Planning Subcommittee shall prepare a consolidated draft Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget no later than December 31st of each year for the Regional General Programs. After consideration of comments and discussion, a final Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget shall be prepared, approved by the Management Committee, and distributed to the Copermittees no later than January 31st of each year. The consolidated Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget shall also identify the party or parties serving as Regional General Program operations fund managers.
 - 6. Modifications to any adopted Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget that will result in an overall increase in cost require the approval of the Regional Management Committee.
 - 7. Copermittees from each Working Body, for which costs will be shared, shall prepare, agree upon and distribute to the participating Copermittees in that watershed, a watershed work plan and Shared Costs Budget.
 - 8. Approval of the Shared Costs Budget for each fiscal year is subject to approval by Copermittee governing bodies as part of their regular annual budgeting process.
- 3. Cumulative Budget Limits
 - a. The total Shared Cost Budget authorized under this MOU may not exceed the cumulative limits specified for each spending category in **Table 1**. These values represent the maximum amount that may be cost-shared for each spending category for the duration of this MOU. **They do not represent funding commitments.** Once a cumulative limit has been reached, the Copermittees must establish separate agreements for sharing additional costs for that budget category. The estimated annual limits shown for each fiscal year are for planning purposes only. Where an estimated annual limit is not reached in any fiscal

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year, the surplus amount may be carried over into subsequent fiscal years, so long as the <u>cumulative limit is not exceeded</u>. Budget limits apply only to their designated budget category. They may not be exchanged or credited across budget categories. Spending in each budget category may not exceed the applicable cumulative limit under any circumstances.

- 4. Management and Payment of Funds
- 1325
- a. For Regional General Programs, the Copermittees shall each pay a yearly assessment into one or more Regional General Program operations funds for their respective portion of any Regional Shared Costs Budget approved pursuant to this MOU. The Regional General Program operations fund shall be managed by the Regional Principal Permittee, or any other Permittee on approval of the Copermittees.
- b. For Watershed General Programs, the applicable watershed Copermittees shall each pay an assessment into one or more Watershed General Program operations funds for their assigned portion of any watershed shared costs budget approved pursuant to this MOU. Each Watershed General Program operations fund shall be managed by the watershed lead permittee, or any other watershed permittee on approval of the participating Copermittees.
- c. The Copermittee managing each General Program operations fund shall provide budget balance and expenditure status reports following the end of each fiscal year. This shall include a detailed accounting of all costs and expenses in accordance with the accepted work plan and Shared Costs Budget, including those incurred by Copermittees providing Working Body Support, contracting services, in-kind services, or other applicable costs.
- d. Each Copermittee shall pay invoices within 60 days of receipt from the Copermittee managing the applicable General Program operations fund.
- e. Funds collected and not expended in any fiscal year shall be credited to the Copermittees' share of the next fiscal year's costs in accordance with the Copermittees' defined shared costs.
- f. Copermittees providing Working Body Support, Contract Administration, in-kind services, or incurring other budgeted costs on behalf of other Copermittees shall provide documentation of those expenses as requested by the Copermittee managing the applicable General Program operations fund. They shall only receive credit for those expenses if a detailed accounting of all costs and expenses meeting the minimum standards agreed upon by the Copermittees has been provided.
- g. Differences in the approved actual cost of expenses from those budgeted shall be either credited or added as appropriate to the amount of the Copermittees' share. In the event that any Copermittees' share of the next fiscal year's costs is less than the amount to be credited, the difference shall be refunded to the Copermittee. Refunds shall be provided to Copermittees no later than 90 days after final accounting.
- h. At its discretion, a Copermittee managing a General Program operations fund may, prior to the completion of a fiscal year, make payment to any Copermittee providing Working Body Support, Contract Administration, in-kind services, or incurring other budgeted expenditures on behalf of other Copermittees so long as all of the conditions of Section II B.4.f above have been satisfied and there are sufficient funds available to make a payment without requiring additional contributions or jeopardizing program objectives. If for some reason excess payment is made, the Copermittee receiving the payment agrees to return the additional payment without any recourse against the managing Copermittee.

III. REGIONAL GENERAL PROGRAMS

In addition to the requirements of Section II, the following apply to Regional General Programs.

A. Regional Principal Permittee

San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU - 9 -

1. The County is hereby designated Regional Principal Permittee (Principal Permittee).

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- a. The County or any other Copermittee may not be compelled to act, or continue acting, as Principal Permittee. A Copermittee may at any time terminate its assignment as Principal Permittee, but shall first make a good faith effort to carry out or transfer existing responsibilities.
- b. In addition to the responsibilities of all Copermittees described in Section II, the Principal Permittee shall provide general coordination for the development and implementation of Regional General Programs, including the following tasks and responsibilities:
 - (1) Establish, chair, and provide overall coordination and leadership of the Regional Stormwater Management Committee (Management Committee) and the Regional Program Planning Subcommittee (Planning Subcommittee).
 - (2) Maintain a current contact list of Copermittees and interested parties.
 - (3) Maintain knowledge of and advise the Copermittees regarding current and proposed state and federal policies, regulations, and other NPDES programs; assist the Copermittees in the development and presentation of positions on these issues before local, state, and federal agencies.

B. Regional Stormwater Management Committee

- 1. The purpose of the Regional Stormwater Management Committee (Management Committee) is to develop, approve, and coordinate urban runoff management programs, and to explore issues of regional significance.
- 2. The Management Committee shall consist of one Representative of each Copermittee. Each Copermittee shall have one vote.
- 3. The Management Committee shall meet at least annually.
- 4. At a minimum, the Management Committee shall have the following responsibilities:
 - a. Address common issues, promote consistency among jurisdictional and watershed programs, and plan and coordinate activities required under the Permit;
 - b. Develop, implement, and arrange for implementation of Regional General Programs;
 - c. Provide a general forum for informing and receiving input from stakeholders and interested parties;
 - d. Provide a forum for public participation in the development and implementation of regional urban runoff management programs and activities;
 - e. Review specific issues pertaining to Working Bodies, make recommendations, or conduct work in support of shared regional priorities or objectives;
 - f. Formally approve the recommendations, work products, and deliverables of Working Bodies presented for consideration;
 - g. Adopt an Annual Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget in accordance with the budgetary limits set forth in Table 1;
 - h. Approve an Annual Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget; and
 - i. Approve year-end Budget Balance and Expenditure Status Reports.
- 5. The Management Committee shall be chaired by the Principal Permittee, or may alternatively be chaired or co-chaired by any other Copermittee. A reassignment or change in the responsibilities of the Principal Permittee requires a three-fourths majority approval of all Copermittees.

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¹³²⁷ 6. Voting Requirements for the Management Committee

- a. For a meeting or a vote to be held, a quorum of a Two-thirds Majority of voting representatives of the Management Committee must either be present or participate remotely via legally acceptable electronic communication (telephone, voice over internet protocol, etc.).
- b. Management Committee voting shall not be conducted outside of meetings (e.g., by email).
- c. For a motion to be approved, an affirmative vote of a Simple Majority of the Management Committee is needed.
- d. On approval of the Management Committee, activities undertaken by a subset of Copermittees, but providing a regional benefit to Copermittees, may be considered Regional General Programs.
- e. Approval of any shared cost requires a unanimous vote of all Copermittees participating in the cost.

C. Regional Program Planning Subcommittee

- 1. The purposes of the Regional Program Planning Subcommittee (Planning Subcommittee) shall be to provide regional coordination of urban runoff management activities, to develop and implement Regional General Programs, and to coordinate the activities of Working Bodies.
- 2. At a minimum, the Planning Subcommittee shall have the following responsibilities:
 - a. Serve as an intermediary between the Management Committee and other Copermittee Working Bodies;
 - b. Plan and coordinate Management Committee meetings;
 - c. Review specific issues pertaining to Regional Working Body(s), make recommendations, or conduct work in support of shared regional priorities or objectives;
 - d. Oversee, coordinate, and track the progress of As-Needed Regional Working Body(s) in developing specific work products, responding to information requests, and completing tasks;
 - e. Establish and maintain a calendar of Copermittee meetings and events;
 - f. Conduct regional program planning including developing an Annual Regional Work Plan and Shared Costs Budget for Management Committee consideration and approval;
 - g. Review and recommend Management Committee approval of work products, recommendations, and requests of Regional Working Body(s) for consideration and approval;
 - h. Annually receive, review, comment on, and consolidate the recommended Work Plans and Shared Costs Budgets of each Regional Working (body(s);
 - i. Coordinate and liaise with Regional Board staff, stakeholders, regulated parties, and other interested parties to identify and explore key regional issues and concerns.
 - j. Provide Representation to the California Stormwater Quality Association (CASQA);
 - k. Provide representation or participation for other professional organizations and societies as appropriate and feasible;
 - 1. Provide regular updates to Copermittees and interested parties via Management Committee meetings or other appropriate means (e-mail, etc.); and
 - m. Provide subject area input as needed for the development, implementation, review, and revision of General Programs, and the development of associated reports and work products.

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- ¹³²⁸ 3. The Planning Subcommittee shall be chaired by the Principal Permittee, or may alternatively be chaired or co-chaired by any other Copermittee upon approval of the Management Committee.
 - 4. Planning Subcommittee meetings shall be open to all Copermittees; however, voting membership in any year shall be limited to one representative of each Watershed Management Area (WMA) listed in Permit Table a.1 except the South Orange County WMA. Any Copermittee may only represent one WMA. For each fiscal year, each WMA will designate a Copermittee as a voting member of the Planning Subcommittee prior to the beginning of that fiscal year. Each WMA may also designate an alternate voting member.
 - 5. Each voting member shall be considered an at-large member. Their purpose is to represent the interests of all Copermittees of this MOU rather than those of their specific WMAs.
 - 6. The Planning Subcommittee may not alter the responsibilities of, or impose new fiscal obligations on, any Copermittee or Working Body, except as approved by the Management Committee. However, the Planning Subcommittee may approve changes to approved Annual Regional Work Plans and Shared Costs Budgets within approved annual budget limits.
 - 7. Voting Requirements for the Planning Subcommittee:
 - a. The Planning Subcommittee shall only make advisory recommendations for items requiring Management Committee approval.
 - b. The Planning Subcommittee may use any voting methodology it deems appropriate to develop advisory recommendations or conduct other business, and, shall present minority or dissenting recommendations for consideration by the Management Committee as applicable.

IV. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Should a dispute arise among any of the parties regarding any matter related to this MOU, the parties agree to first meet and confer in good faith to attempt to resolve the dispute. If that fails to resolve the dispute, they shall submit the matter to mediation.

- 1. Mandatory Non-binding Mediation. If a dispute arises out of, or relates to this MOU, or the breach thereof, and if the dispute cannot be settled through normal contract negotiations, the Parties agree to attempt to settle the dispute in an amicable manner, using mediation under the Mediation Rules of the American Arbitration Association [AAA] or any other neutral organization agreed to by the parties. A mediation session is required before having recourse in a court of law. The cost of mediation shall be borne by the parties equally.
- 2. Selection of Mediator. A single Mediator that is acceptable to all Parties shall be used to mediate the dispute. The Mediator may be selected from lists furnished by the AAA or any other agreed upon Mediator. To initiate mediation, the initiating Party shall serve a Request for Mediation on the opposing Party.
- 3. Conduct of Mediation Sessions. Mediation hearings will be conducted in an informal manner and discovery will not be allowed. All discussions, statements, or admissions in the mediation process will be confidential settlement negotiations under Ca. Evidence Code section 1152. The Parties may agree to exchange any information they deem necessary.
 - a. Both Parties must have an authorized representative attend the mediation. Each representative must have the authority to recommend entering into a settlement. Either Party may have attorney(s) or expert(s) present.

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b. Any agreements resulting from mediation shall be documented in writing. All mediation results and documentation, by themselves, shall be "non-binding" and inadmissible for any purpose in any legal proceeding, unless such admission is otherwise agreed upon, in writing, by both Parties. Mediators shall not be subject to any subpoena or liability and their actions shall not be subject to discovery.

V. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Term of Agreement

- 1. This MOU shall become effective on the date the last party executes the MOU.
- 2. The life of the MOU shall be effective through August 2024, or with the life of the current Permit plus twelve months, whichever is longer. For purposes of this paragraph, any permit renewal or replacement after May 2024 shall be considered a new permit; any earlier amendment of the Permit increasing the obligations of the Regional Principal Permittee or a Watershed Lead Permittee may at that Copermittee's sole option, be declared to be a new permit; and the Management Committee shall determine whether any other earlier amendment to the Permit is of such significance as to effectively be a new Permit.

B. Withdrawal of Copermittee

- 1. Participation in this MOU may be withdrawn by any Copermittee for any reason only after the Copermittee complies with all of the following conditions of withdrawal:
 - a. The Copermittee shall notify all of the other Copermittees in writing 90 days prior to its intended date of withdrawal.
 - b. Any expenses associated with withdrawal, including but not limited to, filing and obtaining the withdrawing Copermittee's individual NPDES permit and the amendment of the Permit will be solely the responsibility of the withdrawing Copermittee.
 - c. The withdrawing Copermittee shall be responsible for their portion of any shared costs incurred according to the conditions of this MOU up to the time that each of the conditions in Section V.B.1.a. has been met.
 - d. Any monies paid by withdrawing Copermittee in excess of the amount due under the terms of the MOU shall be refunded to the Copermittee at the time the withdrawal becomes final as set forth in Section V.B.1.a.
 - e. The withdrawing Copermittee shall not be entitled to participate in the division of proceeds in any reserve fund account when the MOU is dissolved.

C. Non-Compliance with MOU Requirements

- 1. Any participant to this MOU found to be in non-compliance with the conditions of this MOU shall be solely liable for any lawfully assessed penalties resulting from such non-compliance. Failure to comply with MOU conditions within specified or agreed upon timelines shall constitute non-compliance with the MOU.
- 2. Limitations on Use of Funds. Notwithstanding the rights and obligations of the Parties created by this MOU, no Party may be found in breach of this MOU where compliance would require that Party to violate any law or grant assurance, including but not limited to provisions of the Federal Aviation Administration 1999 Policy and Procedure Concerning the Use of Airport Revenue [64

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Fed. Reg. 7696, dated Feb. 16, 1999]; the Airport and Airway Improvement Act of 1982 codified at 49 U.S.C. § 47107(b); the Federal Aviation Administration Authorization Act of 1994, P.L. 103-305 (Aug. 23, 1994); the Airport Revenue Protection Act of 1996, Title VIII of the Federal Aviation Administration Act of 1996, P.L. 104-264 (Oct. 9, 1996), 110 Stat. 3269 (Oct. 9, 1996); 49 U.S.C. § 46301(n)(5); and 49 U.S.C. § 47133. The Parties recognize that the Authority has received federal Airport Improvement Project ("AIP") grants containing grant assurance 25, which provides: "All revenues generated by the airport . . . will be expended by it for the capital or operating costs of the airport; the local airport system; or other local facilities which are owned or operated by the owner or operator of the airport and which are directly and substantially related to the actual air transportation of passengers or property; or for noise mitigation purposes on or off the airport."

D. Amendments to the Memorandum of Understanding

This MOU may be amended only by unanimous consent of all Copermittees. No amendment shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the duly authorized representatives of the Copermittees.

E. Governing Law

This MOU shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. If any provision or provisions shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.

The headings used throughout this MOU are for convenience only and do not in any way limit or amplify the terms or provisions of the MOU.

F. Consent and Breach Not Waiver

No term or provision hereof shall be deemed waived and no breach excused, unless such waiver or consent shall be in writing and signed by the Copermittee to have waived or consented. Any consent by any Copermittee to, or waiver of, a breach by the other, whether expressed or implied, shall not constitute a consent to, waiver of, or excuse for any other different or subsequent breach.

G. No Indemnification

- 1. Each Copermittee shall have the sole responsibility to comply with the Permit.
- 2. Each Copermittee shall pay all fines, penalties, and costs which may arise out of such Copermittee's non-compliance with the Permit.
- 3. By entering into this MOU, no Copermittee assumes liability for claims or actions arising out of the performance of any work or actions or omissions, by any other Copermittee, its agents, officers, and employees under this MOU.
- 4. By entering into this MOU, each Copermittee agrees to defend itself from any claim, action or proceeding arising out of the acts or omissions of itself and retain its own legal counsel, and bear its own defense costs.

H. Application of Prior Agreements

This MOU constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter; all prior agreements, representations, statements, negotiations, and undertakings are superseded hereby.

Fourth Amended: date

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I. Right to Audit

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Each Party retains the right to review and audit, and the reasonable right of access to other Parties' respective premises to review and audit the other Parties' compliance with the provisions of this MOU (Party's Right). The Party's Right includes the right to inspect and photocopy same, and to retain copies, outside of the Parties' premises, of any and all records, including any and all books, records, and documents, related to this MOU with appropriate safeguards, if such retention is deemed necessary by the auditing Party in its sole discretion. This information shall be kept by the auditing Party in the strictest confidence allowed by law.

J. Execution of Agreement

This MOU may be executed in counterpart and the signed counterparts shall constitute a single instrument. In the event that any Copermittee is unable to execute this amendment prior to August 31, 2019, execution of this amendment after that date shall constitute ratification of this amendment, and the MOU and extensions shall be in effect once all signatures are obtained.

¹³³² A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ENCINITAS, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING THE FOURTH AMENDMENT TO THE NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES) SAN DIEGO REGIONAL STORMWATER COPERMITTEES MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU)

WHEREAS, on May 8, 2013, the San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board (SDRWQCB) issued NPDES Order No. R9-2013-0001, as amended by NPDES Order Nos. R9-2015-0001 and R9-2015-0100, which includes requirements in addition to those that were imposed on the Copermittees, including the City of Encinitas, in NPDES Permit No. R9-2007-001;

WHEREAS, per Resolution 2007-50, the City of Encinitas entered into a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on December 12, 2007 to comply with the NPDES Permit No. 2007-0001 requirement that they cooperate in the implementation of activities and programs;

WHEREAS, per Resolution 2010-29, the City of Encinitas approved a First Amendment to the NPDES San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU, on June 15, 2010 in order to allow the refund of budgeted but unspent funds to the parties at the conclusion of each fiscal year;

WHEREAS, per Resolution 2014-47, the City of Encinitas approved the Second Amendment to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System San Diego Regional Stormwater Copermittees MOU, on June 25, 2014 to clarify the termination date of August 31, 2015, and clarify conditions of breach of the MOU;

WHEREAS, per Resolution 2015-73, the City of Encinitas approved the Third Amendment to the MOU on October 28, 2015, extending the termination date of the MOU through August 2019,;

WHEREAS, the Copermittees wish to amend the MOU (Fourth Amendment), and extend the termination date of the MOU through August 2024; and

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Chapter 20.08 STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

20.08.010 Title.

This chapter shall be known as the "City of Encinitas Stormwater Management and Discharge Control Ordinance." (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.020 Purpose and Intent.

The purpose of this chapter is to protect the health, safety and welfare of the public by regulating all discharges into the stormwater conveyance system and the Waters of the State in order to preserve and enhance water quality for beneficial uses by:

A. Prohibiting non-stormwater discharges to the stormwater conveyance system;

B. Eliminating pollutants in stormwater to the maximum extent practicable, including pollutants from both point and non-point sources;

C. Prohibiting activities which cause, or contribute to, exceedance of state and federal receiving water quality objectives;

D. Protecting watercourses from disturbance and pollution.

The intent of this chapter is to use the police power of the city to protect, enhance, and regulate water quality in a manner which complies with all applicable laws related to water quality, including the federal Clean Water Act, the state Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act, and the California Regional Water Quality Control Board San Diego Region Order No. R9-2013-0001 adopted on May 8, 2013, NPDES No. CAS0109266 and any subsequent amendments, revisions, or reissuance of the permit. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.030 Definitions.

For purposes of this chapter only, the terms below have the following meaning:

"Beneficial uses" means uses of water necessary for the survival or well-being of humans, plants, and wildlife. These uses of water serve to promote the tangible and intangible economic, social, and environmental goals. Beneficial uses of the Waters of the State that may be protected against include, but are not limited to, domestic, municipal, agricultural and industrial supply; power generation; recreation; aesthetic enjoyment; navigation; and preservation and enhancement of fish, wildlife, and other aquatic resources or preserves. Existing beneficial uses are uses that were attained in the surface or groundwater on or after November 28, 1975; and potential beneficial uses are uses that would probably develop in future years through the implementation of various control measures. Beneficial uses are equivalent to designated uses under federal law. [California Water Code Section 13050(f)].

"Best management practices" or "BMPs" means schedules of activities, pollution treatment practices or devices, prohibitions of practices, general good housekeeping practices, pollution prevention and educational practices, operation and maintenance procedures, and other management practices or devices to prevent or reduce the discharge of pollutants directly or indirectly to stormwater, receiving waters, or the stormwater conveyance system. BMPs may be structural or non-structural. Best management practices include, but are not limited to, site design, source control, treatment control, natural design methods, low flow diversions to the sewer, and structures such as infiltration basins, clarifiers, oil and grease separators, and filters. BMPs may include any type of pollution prevention and pollution control measure that can help to achieve compliance with this chapter.

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"BMP maintenance" refers to the regular action taken to maintain the as-designed performance and functionality of a permanent or being BMP, and includes, but is not limited to, repairs to the BMP as necessary and replacement of the BMP by an equally effective or more effective BMP at the end of its useful life.

"City" means the City of Encinitas.

¹⁴⁶¹"Clean Water Act Section 303(d) Impaired Water Body" or "impaired water body" means an impaired water body in which water quality does not meet applicable water quality standards and/or is not expected to meet water quality standards, even after the application of technology based pollution controls required by the Clean Water Act. The discharge of urban runoff to these water bodies is significant because these discharges can cause or contribute to violations of applicable water quality standards.

"Discharge" when used as a verb, means to allow pollutants to directly or indirectly enter stormwater, or to allow stormwater or non-stormwater to directly or indirectly enter the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters, from an activity or operations. When used as a noun, "discharge" means the pollutants, stormwater and/or non-stormwater that is discharged.

"Discharger" means any person engaged in activities or operations, or owning facilities, which may result in pollutants entering stormwater, the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters. "Dischargers" include, but are not limited to, real and personal property owners, occupants, tenants, lessees, contractors, developers, managers and employees.

"Enforcement staff" means any City employee or authorized contractor hired by the City who is assigned to duties involving permits and other City approvals, inspections, or enforcement related to this chapter.

"Environmentally Sensitive Areas (ESAs)" include, but are not limited to, all Clean Water Act Section 303(d) impaired water bodies; areas designated as Areas of Special Biological Significance by the State Water Resources Control Board (Water Quality Control Plan for the San Diego Basin (1994) and amendments); water bodies designated with the RARE beneficial use by the State Water Resources Control Board (Water Quality Control Plan for the San Diego Basin (1994) and amendments); areas designated as preserves or their equivalent under the Multi-Species Conservation Program within the cities and County of San Diego; and any other similar environmentally sensitive areas which have been identified by the City. "Directly adjacent" means situated within 200 feet of the Environmentally Sensitive Area. "Discharging directly to" means outflow from a drainage conveyance system that is composed entirely of flows from the subject development or redevelopment site, and not commingled with flows from adjacent lands.

"Groundwater" means subsurface water that occurs beneath the water table in soils and geologic formations that are fully saturated. Water table is the depth or elevation at which soil pore spaces or fractures and voids become completely saturated with water.

"Illegal connection" means a physical connection to the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters, which has not been reviewed and authorized by the City; or a permitted connection, which conveys illegal discharges.

"Illegal discharge" is any discharge to the stormwater conveyance system that is not composed entirely of stormwater or is not discharged in compliance with this chapter. This includes, but is not limited to, discharges of non-stormwater that are not exempt as defined by this chapter, discharges of irrigation runoff to the MS4, any discharge from an illegal connection, and any discharge that contains additional pollutants due to the absence of a required BMP or the failure of a BMP. Discharges that require a City permit or a RWQCB permit that has not been issued or has not been acknowledged by the discharger to be applicable are illegal discharges. Discharges regulated under an applicable NPDES permit are illegal discharges for purposes of this chapter unless compliance with all applicable permit conditions is maintained.

"Impervious surface" means constructed or modified surfaces that cannot effectively infiltrate rainfall such as building rooftops, pavement, sidewalks, driveways, etc.

"Impervious surface area" means the ground area covered or sheltered by an impervious surface, measured in plan view, i.e., as if from directly above. For example, the "impervious surface area" for a pitched roof is equal to the ground area it shelters, rather than the surface area of the roof itself.

"Maximum extent practicable" or "MEP" refers to the standard established by Congress in Clean Water Act Section 402(p)(3)(B)(iii) that municipal dischargers of stormwater must meet; MEP is an acceptability standard for best management practices based on a level of pollutant reduction that can be achieved by the most effective set of BMPs

that can be implemented and still remain practicable; MEP generally emphasizes pollution prevention and source control RMPG as the first line of defense in combination with treatment methods as a backup. Stormwater

"Municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4)" (see also, "stormwater conveyance system") means a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters,

1462 ditches, man-made channels, or storm drains): (1) owned or operated by a state, city, town, borough, county, parish, district, association, or other public body (created by or pursuant to state law) having jurisdiction over disposal of sewage, industrial wastes, stormwater, or other wastes, including special districts under state law such as a sewer district, flood control district or drainage district, or similar entity, or an Indian tribe or an authorized Indian tribal organization, or designated and approved management agency under Section 208 of the CWA that discharges to waters of the United States; (2) designated or used for collecting or conveying stormwater; (3) which is not a combined sewer; (4) which is not part of the publicly owned treatment works (POTW) as defined at 40 CFR 122.26.

"MS4 permit" refers to RWQCB Order No. R9-2013-0001, and any subsequent amendments, revisions, or reissuance of the permit.

"Non-point source" refers to diffuse, widespread sources of pollution. These sources may be large or small, but are generally numerous throughout a watershed. Non-point sources include, but are not limited to, urban, agricultural, or industrial areas, roads, highways, construction sites, communities served by septic systems, recreational boating activities, timber harvesting, mining, livestock grazing, as well as physical changes to stream channels, and habitat degradation. Non-point source pollution can occur year round any time rainfall, snow melt, irrigation, or any other source of water runs over land or through the ground, picks up pollutants from these numerous, diffuse sources and deposits them into rivers, lakes, and coastal waters or introduces them into groundwater.

"Non-stormwater discharge" is any discharge to the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters that is not composed entirely of stormwater.

"NPDES permit" means a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the State Water Resources Control Board ("SWRCB"), or the California Regional Water Quality Control Board for the San Diego Region ("RWQCB").

"Permanent BMP" means a structural, source control, or treatment control best management practice designed to detain, retain, filter, remove and/or prevent the release of pollutants to surface waters from development projects and required to remain in perpetuity, after construction of a project is completed.

"Person" means an individual, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, joint venture, non-profit organization, trust, association, or governmental agency.

"Point source" means any discernible, confined, and discrete conveyance, including, but not limited to, any pipe, ditch, channel, tunnel, conduit, well, discrete fissure, container, rolling stock, concentrated animal feeding operations, landfill leachate collection systems, vessel, or other floating craft from which pollutants are or may be discharged.

"Pollutant" is broadly defined as any agent that may cause or contribute to the degradation of water quality such that a condition of pollution or contamination is created or aggravated.

"Pollution" is the alteration of the quality of the receiving waters to a degree that unreasonably affects the beneficial use of the receiving waters or the facilities that serve the beneficial uses. "Pollution" also includes contamination which creates a hazard to the public health through poisoning or the spread of disease.

"Receiving waters" means all waters that are "Waters of the State" within the scope of the State Water Code, including, but not limited to, natural streams, creeks, rivers, reservoirs, lakes, ponds, water in vernal pools, lagoons, estuaries, bays, the Pacific Ocean, and groundwater.

"RWQCB" means the California Regional Water Quality Control Board for the San Diego Region.

"Stormwater" means runoff which originates from precipitation events. "Stormwater" is that portion of precipitation that flows across a surface to the storm drain system or receiving waters. Examples of this phenomenon include: the water that flows off a building's roof when it rains (runoff from an impervious surface); the water that flows into streams when snow on the ground begins to melt (runoff from a semi-pervious surface); and the water that flows from a vegetated surface when rainfall is in excess of the rate at which it can infiltrate into the underlying soil (runoff from a pervious surface). During precipitation events in urban areas, rain water picks up and transports pollutants through stormwater conveyance systems, and ultimately to receiving waters. 387

"Stormwater conveyance system" (see also, "MS4") means private and public drainage facilities within the City of Encipited to water may be conveyed to waters of the United States, including, but not limited to, streets, roads, catch basins, natural and artificial channels, natural and artificial drainage features, aqueducts, canyons, stream beds, gullies, curbs, gutters, ditches, and storm drains. Historic and current development makes use of natural drainage patterns and features as conveyances for urban runoff. Urban streams used in this manner are part of the

stormwater conveyance system regardless of whether they are natural, man-made, or partially modified features. In these cases, the urban stream is both a stormwater conveyance system and a receiving water.

"Structural BMP" means a BMP that relies on either a physical condition (other than an entirely natural and undisturbed condition), or on a constructed or installed device to reduce or prevent pollutants in stormwater discharges and exempt non-stormwater discharges. Constructed or enhanced BMPs that depend on natural materials and processes (e.g., constructed drainage swales or buffers, or constructed wetlands), that require periodic maintenance to function as designed, are structural BMPs.

"SWRCB" means the State Water Resources Control Board.

"Treatment control best management practice (TCBMP)" is a permanent BMP designed to remove pollutants by gravity settling, filtration, biological uptake, media absorption or any other physical, biological, or chemical process.

"Waters of the State" means any water, surface or underground, including saline waters within the boundaries of California. The definition of the "Waters of the State" is broader than that for the "Waters of the United States" in that all water in the state is considered to be a "Waters of the State" regardless of circumstances or condition. Under this definition, a municipal storm sewer system (MS4) is always considered to be a "Waters of the State" (California Water Code Section 13050(e)).

"Waters of the United States" means water subject to the regulatory jurisdiction of the United States under the Federal Clean Water Act and applicable case law. In general, this includes "navigable" waters, waters tributary to "navigable" waters, and adjacent wetlands. (40 Code of Federal Regulations Section 122.2). (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.040 Discharge Prohibitions.

A. Discharge of Stormwater. No person shall discharge stormwater directly or indirectly into the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters, unless discharged in compliance with this chapter.

B. Discharge of Non-Stormwater Prohibited. No person shall discharge non-stormwater directly or indirectly into the stormwater conveyance system or receiving waters, except as provided below in Section <u>20.08.050</u>.

C. Liability for Illegal Discharge. Liability for any illegal discharge shall be the responsibility of the person(s) causing, contributing, or responsible for the illegal discharge, and such person(s) shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City in any administrative or judicial enforcement action relating to such discharges.

D. Prevention of Illegal Discharges. Throwing, depositing, leaving, abandoning, maintaining or keeping materials or wastes on public or private lands in a manner and place that results in or contributes to a violation of the MS4 permit is unlawful.

E. Violations of the MS4 permit. It is unlawful for any person to cause, or threaten to cause, either individually or jointly any discharge into or from the MS4 that results in or contributes to a violation of the MS4 permit. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.050 Exemptions to Discharge Prohibitions.

A. Permitted Discharges. Any discharge to the MS4 that is regulated under a NPDES permit issued to the discharger and administered by the State of California pursuant to Division 7 of the California Water Code is allowed, provided that the discharger is in compliance with all requirements of the NPDES permit and other applicable laws and regulations.

B. Groundwater Discharges Typically Requiring Permits. Non-stormwater discharges to the MS4 from the following categories are allowed if: (i) the discharger obtains coverage under NPDES Permit No. CAG919002 (RWQCB Order No. R9-2008-0002, or subsequent order) for discharges to surface waters other than San Diego Bay, and the discharger is in compliance with all requirements of the applicable NPDES permit and all other applicable laws and regulations; or (ii) the RWQCB determines in switching that coverage under NPDES Permit No. CAG919002

(or subsequent permit) is not required. Otherwise, non-stormwater discharges from the following categories are ille and scharges AFT

Discharges from uncontaminated pumped groundwater; 1.

Stormwater

- Discharges from foundation drains when the system is designed to be located at or below the groundwater 2. table to actively or passively extract groundwater during any part of the year;
 - 3. Discharges from water from crawl space pumps;
 - 4. Discharges from water from footing drains when the system is designed to be located at or below the groundwater table to actively or passively extract groundwater during any part of the year.

C. Discharges from Water Lines. Non-stormwater discharges to the MS4 from water line flushing and water main breaks are allowed if the discharges have coverage under NPDES Permit No. CAG679001 (Regional Water Quality Control Board Order No. R9-2010-0003, or subsequent order), and the discharger is in compliance with all requirements of that NPDES permit and other applicable laws and regulations. This category includes water line flushing and water main break discharges from water purveyors issued a water supply permit by the California Department of Public Health or federal military installations. Discharges from recycled or reclaimed water lines to the MS4 are allowed if the discharges have coverage under an NPDES permit, and the discharger is in compliance with the applicable NPDES permit and other applicable laws and regulations. Otherwise, discharges from water lines are illegal discharges.

D. Allowable Discharges. Non-stormwater discharges to the MS4 from the following categories are allowed, unless the authorized enforcement staff or the Regional Water Quality Control Board identifies the discharge as a source of pollutants to receiving waters, in which case the discharge is considered an illegal discharge:

- Discharges from diverted stream flows; 1.
- 2. Discharges from rising groundwater;
- 3. Discharges from uncontaminated groundwater infiltration to the MS4;
- Discharges from springs; 4.
- 5. Discharges from flows from riparian habitats and wetlands;

Discharges from potable water sources, except as set forth in Encinitas Municipal Code Section 20.08.050 6. and except that irrigation runoff discharges are considered illegal discharges and are not allowed;

Discharges from foundation drains when the system is designed to be located above the groundwater table 7. at all times of the year, and the system is only expected to produce non-stormwater discharges under unusual circumstances; and

Discharges from footing drains when the system is designed to be located above the groundwater table at 8. all times of the year, and the system is only expected to produce non-stormwater discharges under unusual circumstances.

E. Conditionally Allowed Discharges. Non-stormwater discharges from the following categories are allowed if they are addressed as follows. Otherwise, non-stormwater discharges from the following categories are illegal discharges:

1. Air Conditioning Condensation. Air conditioning condensation shall be directed to landscaped areas or other pervious surfaces, or to the sanitary sewer, where feasible, as determined by the authorized enforcement staff.

Individual Residential Vehicle Washing. Wash water from individual residential vehicle washing should 2. be directed to landscaped areas or other pervious surfaces, where feasible as determined by the authorized enforcement staff. Minimizing water use, detergent, and other vehicle wash products, and other BMPs to prevent the discharge of pollutants to the MS4 are encouraged. Non-commercial car washes, such as fundraisers and other similar activities, are not considered individual residential vehicle washing, and are therefor considered illegal discharges.

Water From Swimming Pools. 3.

> Chlorinated Swimming Pool Water. Chlorine, algaecide, filter backwash, and other pollutants shall a. be eliminated prior to discharging swimming pool water to the MS4.

Leucadia Storniwater WORKING DRAFT areas, or other pervious surfaces that can accommodate the volume of water unless the saline swimming pool water can be discharged through a pipe or concrete channel directly to a naturally saline water body.

¹⁴⁶⁵F. Firefighting Activities. Non-stormwater discharges to the MS4 from firefighting activities are allowed if they are addressed as follows:

1. Non-Emergency Firefighting Discharges. Non-emergency firefighting discharges, including building fire suppression system maintenance discharges (e.g. sprinkler line flushing), controlled or practice blazes, training, and maintenance activities shall be addressed by BMPs to prevent the discharge of pollutants to the MS4.

2. Emergency Firefighting Discharges. BMPs are encouraged to prevent pollutants from entering the MS4. During emergencies, priority of efforts should be directed toward life, property, and the environment (in descending order). BMPs shall not interfere with emergency response operations or impact public health and safety.

G. Conditionally Allowed Discharges Not Absolute. Any conditionally allowed discharge described above which the enforcement staff determines is a significant source of pollutants to receiving waters shall be prohibited unless the discharger complies with additional BMPs imposed by the enforcement staff to reduce pollutants in the discharge to the maximum extent practicable and the BMPs are effective. Such prohibitions shall take effect after written notice to the discharger by the enforcement staff containing a schedule for compliance based on the necessity to protect public health and safety or the environment. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.060 Notification and Mitigation of Illegal Discharges.

A discharger shall immediately notify enforcement staff of an illegal discharge and take immediate action to control and contain the illegal discharge. The discharger shall also mitigate any damage caused by the illegal discharge.

The enforcement staff may order the discharger to prepare and implement an approved mitigation plan with a time schedule for completion. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.070 Illegal Connections.

No person shall establish, use, or maintain an illegal connection to the stormwater conveyance system or the receiving waters. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.080 Littering and Sweeping.

No person shall throw, deposit, leave, maintain, keep or permit to be thrown, deposited, placed, left or maintained, any refuse, pet waste, rubbish, garbage, or other discarded or abandoned objects, in or upon any street, alley, parking lot, sidewalk, curb, gutter, storm drain, catch basin, conduit, or other drainage structure or lot except in receptacles maintained for the regular disposal of garbage. Impervious surfaces which drain directly or indirectly into the stormwater conveyance system shall be kept free of dirt and debris by regular sweeping. The sweepings shall be placed in garbage receptacles and shall not be allowed to enter the stormwater conveyance system. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.090 Compliance with Best Management Practices (BMPs).

No discharger shall fail to implement, install, use, or maintain best management practices pursuant to the Stormwater Standards Manual and to this chapter. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.100 Conclusive Determination of Maximum Extent Practicable.

The best management practices established pursuant to the Stormwater Standards Manual and to this chapter shall reduce pollutants from the use or activity to the maximum extent practicable. For purposes of enforcement of this chapter, the enforcement staff's determination of the maximum extent practicable shall be conclusive. (Ord. 2015-07)

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Leucadia Stormwater

20.08.10 Rest Management Practices (BMP) Requirements for All Dischargers.

Best Management Practices. Any person engaged in activities which may result in discharges to the stormwater conveyance system shall, to the maximum extent practicable, undertake all measures to reduce the risk of non-stormwater discharges and pollutant discharges. The following requirements shall apply:

A. Every person undertaking any activity or use of a premises that may cause or contribute to stormwater pollution or contamination, illicit discharges, or non-stormwater discharges to the MS4 shall comply with BMP guidelines or pollution control requirements, as may be established by the authorized staff. BMPs shall be maintained routinely throughout the life of the activity. Such BMPs include the minimum BMPs set forth in the Stormwater Standards Manual.

B. Authorized enforcement staff may require any business or operation that is engaged in activities which may result in pollutant discharges to the MS4 to develop and implement a stormwater pollution prevention plan, which must include an employee training program and the applicable minimum BMPs from the Stormwater Standards Manual.

C. Each discharger that is subject to any NPDES permit shall comply with all requirements of all such permits. The discharger must also make reports submitted to the RWQCB or other permitting agency, including monitoring data, available to the City upon request.

D. Parties undertaking land disturbance activities shall comply with all applicable requirements of this chapter, the Stormwater Standards Manual, Engineering Design Manual and Encinitas Municipal Code Chapter 23.24 (Grading and Erosion Control). (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.120 BMP Requirements for Land Disturbance Activity.

A. Permit Issuance. No landowner or development project proponent shall receive any City grading, clearing, building or other land development permit required for land disturbance activity without first meeting the requirements of this chapter and the Stormwater Standards Manual with respect to the portion of the development project and the land disturbance activity to which the permit at issue would apply.

B. Owners and Operators both Responsible and Liable. Persons or entities performing land disturbance activities (including, but not limited to, construction activities) in the City, and the owners of land on which land disturbance activities are performed, are dischargers for purposes of this chapter; provided, however, that a local government or public authority is not a discharger as to activities conducted by others in public rights-of-way.

C. Plan Submittals. All applications to the City for a permit or approval associated with a land disturbance activity must demonstrate how the proposed activity will comply with all applicable requirements in a format specified by the City. The submitted materials shall specify the manner in which the discharger/applicant will implement the BMPs required by this chapter and the Engineering Design Manual for the activity at issue. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.130 Requirements for Development and Redevelopment Projects.

A. Application to Development and Redevelopment Projects. No landowner or development project proponent in the City shall receive any City grading, clearing, building or other land development permit required for land development activity or redevelopment activity unless the project meets or will meet the requirements of this chapter and the applicable requirements defined in the Engineering Design Manual.

B. Owners and Developers Responsible and Liable. Developers, development project proponents, and landowners for land on which development activities are performed, are dischargers for purposes of this chapter; provided, however, that a local government or public authority is not a discharger as to activities conducted by others in public rights-of-way.

C. Permanent Best Management Practices Required. Land development and redevelopment activities with the potential to add pollutants to stormwater or to affect the flow rate or velocity of stormwater runoff after construction is completed, shall be designed to include and shall implement BMPs to ensure that pollutants and runoff from the development will be reduced to the MEP, will not significantly degrade receiving water quality, and will not cause or

contribute to an exceedance of water quality standards in accordance with the requirements defined in the Engineering Design Manual. (Ord. 2015-07)

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20.08.140 Maintenance of BMPs.

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Existing Development. Dischargers shall maintain the designed functionality of the BMPs they rely upon to A. achieve and maintain compliance with this chapter.

Permanent BMPs. The owners and occupants of lands on which permanent BMPs have been installed to meet В. the requirements of this chapter shall ensure the maintenance of those BMPs pursuant to this chapter, and shall themselves maintain those BMPs if other persons or entities who are also obliged to maintain those BMPs (by contract or covenant, or pursuant to this chapter) fail to do so.

C. Maintenance Obligations Assumed by Covenant or Other Agreement. Primary responsibility to maintain a BMP may be transferred through a covenant or other agreement. If that covenant provides that it will be submitted to the City pursuant to this chapter as part of a development permit application, and if that covenant is so submitted, the person or entity accepting a maintenance obligation in such a covenant or agreement will also be legally obliged to maintain that BMP pursuant to this chapter.

D. Obligation to Maintain BMPs not Avoided by Covenants or Other Agreements. For purposes of City enforcement, no covenant or other agreement imposing an obligation to maintain a BMP can relieve a person or entity of any obligation to maintain a BMP imposed by this chapter.

Disclosure of Maintenance Obligations. Any developer who transfers ownership of land on which a BMP is E. located or will be located, or who otherwise transfers ownership of a BMP or responsibility for the maintenance of a BMP to another person or entity, shall provide clear written notice of the maintenance obligations associated with that BMP to the new or additional responsible party prior to that transfer.

Maintenance Plans for Land Development Activities. The proponents of any land development activity or F. redevelopment activity that requires installation of permanent BMPs shall provide to the City for review and approval prior to issuance of permits for the project, a plan for maintenance of all permanent BMPs associated with the project in accordance with the Engineering Design Manual. The plan shall specify the persons or entities responsible for maintenance activity, the persons or entities responsible for funding, schedules and procedures for inspection and maintenance of the BMPs, worker training requirements, and any other activities necessary to ensure BMP maintenance. The plan shall provide for servicing of all permanent BMPs, at least annually, and for the retention of inspection and maintenance records for at least three years.

G. Access for Maintenance. Permanent BMPs shall be provided adequate access for long-term inspection and maintenance purposes.

Assurance of Maintenance for Land Development Projects. The proponents of any land development activity or H. redevelopment activity that requires a City permit shall provide to the City, prior to issuance of permits for the project, proof of a mechanism acceptable to the City which will ensure ongoing long-term maintenance of all permanent BMPs associated with the proposed project. The proponents shall be responsible for maintenance of BMPs unless, and until, an alternative mechanism for ensuring maintenance is accepted by the City and becomes effective.

Ι Permanent BMP Inspection and Maintenance Verification. The owners and occupants of lands on which permanent BMPs have been installed to meet the requirements of this chapter shall maintain records of routine inspection and maintenance of permanent BMPs. Records shall be submitted to the City upon request. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.150 Discharger Sampling, Testing, Monitoring, and Reporting.

The enforcement staff may require dischargers to perform sampling, testing, monitoring and reporting of А. results as a best management practice. In addition, the enforcement staff may order a discharger to conduct testing or monitoring and to report the results to the City in any of the following scenarios:

1. The enforcement staff determines that testing or monitoring is needed to determine whether BMPs are effectively preventing or reducing pollutants in stormwater to the maximum extent practicable, or to determine February 17, 2021 J. - 3. An illegal discharge has not been eliminated after written notice by the enforcement staff; or
- 4. The discharger is in violation of any provision of this chapter, or the Regional Water Quality Control Board requires the City to provide information on the discharger's activities.
- B. Testing and monitoring ordered pursuant to this section may include the following:
 - 1. Visual monitoring of dry weather flows, wet weather erosion, or BMPs;
 - 2. Visual monitoring of premises for spills or discharges;
 - 3. Laboratory analyses of stormwater or non-stormwater discharges for pollutants;
 - 4. Background or baseline monitoring or analysis; and
 - 5. Monitoring of receiving waters or sediments that may be affected by pollutant discharges by the discharger.

C. The enforcement staff may direct the time and manner in which the results of required testing and monitoring are reported, and shall determine when required sampling, testing or monitoring may be discontinued. The sampling, testing, monitoring and reporting shall be at the expense of the discharger. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.160 City Authority to Sample, Inspect and Monitor.

A. Regulatory Inspections. The enforcement staff or designee may inspect the premises of any discharger at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner to carry out the purposes of this chapter. If a discharger refuses to allow entry for an inspection, an inspection warrant shall be obtained prior to inspection.

B. Scope of Inspections. Inspections may include all actions necessary to determine whether any illegal discharges or illegal connections exist, whether the BMPs installed and implemented are adequate to comply with this chapter, whether those BMPs are being properly maintained, and whether the discharger complies with other requirements of this chapter. This may include sampling, metering, monitoring, visual inspections, and records review. Where samples are collected the discharger may request and receive split samples. Records, reports, analyses, or other required information may be inspected and copied, and photographs taken for purposes of enforcement of this chapter.

C. Installation of Sampling Devices. As part of the inspection, the enforcement staff may authorize the installation of sampling or metering devices. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.170 Establishment of a Fee.

The City Council may establish a fee by resolution to recover the cost of inspection, sampling, metering, or monitoring by the enforcement staff. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.180 Violation of a State NPDES Permit.

A violation of an NPDES stormwater permit other than the MS4 permit that results in or threatens to result in a discharge of pollutants to the stormwater conveyance system shall also be considered a violation of this chapter and may be enforced as such. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.190 Permits and Approvals.

Compliance with this chapter shall be a condition of every permit or approval granted or issued by the City. Failure to comply with this chapter shall be grounds for revocation of any such permit or approval. (Ord. 2015-07)

The City Council hereby declares that any violation of this chapter is a threat to public health, safety, and welfare and is deemed would public huisance (Ord. 2015-07) Stormwater

20.08.210 Enforcement of this Chapter.

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A. Misdemeanor Violation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Code, a violation of this chapter is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000.00 or imprisonment in the County Jail for a period of not more than six months or both fine and imprisonment. Any such violation may be charged as an infraction at the discretion of the City Attorney. Any person convicted of an infraction under the provisions of this chapter shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00 for a first or second offense in one year, and not to exceed \$1,000.00 for a third violation in one year.

B. Orders of the Public Works Director. The Public Works Director is authorized to issue cease and desist orders or stop work orders to any person who is in violation of this chapter. Failure to comply with a written order of the Public Works Director shall be a violation of this chapter and shall be grounds for the imposition of the civil penalties described in this section.

C. Civil Penalties. Any person who violates a provision of this chapter may be assessed a civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000.00 for each violation, for each day the violation is committed, continued, permitted or maintained. The civil penalties may be imposed by the enforcement staff after written notice and a hearing before the City Manager or his/her designee at which the person may present evidence and cross examine the witnesses in support of the charges. Civil penalties may also be assessed by the court in a civil action filed by the City to enforce the provisions of this chapter.

D. Abatement. Any violation of this chapter may be abated as a public nuisance and costs of abatement may be recovered by the City as allowed by law.

E. Administrative Fines. Any violation of this chapter is subject to administrative fines as provided by this Code.

F. Judicial Action. This chapter is enforceable by any judicial action allowed by law, including, but not limited to, injunctive relief.

G. Liens. Costs of enforcement of this chapter, including, but not limited to, costs of investigation, sampling and monitoring costs, and unpaid administrative fines and civil penalties, shall constitute a lien against the real property on which the violation occurs and on the real property of any person who violates this chapter until such lien is satisfied. The lien may be recorded and executed in the same manner as a judgment lien. Prior to the recordation of the lien, the property owner shall be given written notice of the lien and an opportunity to contest the validity of the lien and the amount at a hearing held by the City Manager or his/her designee.

H. Remedies Not Exclusive. Remedies under this chapter shall be in addition to each other, and in addition to any other legally available remedy, and do not limit or supersede any other enforcement action, civil, criminal or administrative. (Ord. 2015-07)

20.08.220 Severability.

If any section, subsection, or part of this chapter is declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and enforceable so as to effectuate the purpose and intent of this chapter. (Ord. 2015-07)

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
